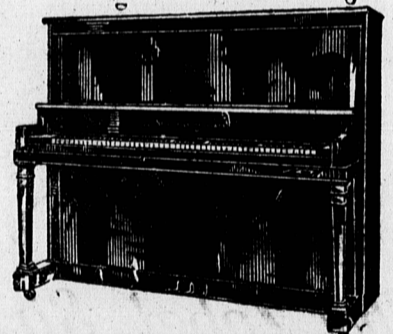

It is the intention of the Executive, to secure the services of the lecturers versed in wild life and its economical value to the community in order to stimulate interest in the preservation of our remaining fur and feathered friends.
