vice Commission and the OBC Board of Governors.

No Margarine Appeal

The Minister told questioners no appeal was being considered by the Government, at the moment, from the Supreme Court's ruling against Federal laws prohibiting the manufacture and sale of margarine.

Furthermore, he said, the Government was considering what priority might be given to legislation at the forthcoming session to abolish all appeals to the Privy Council judicial committee.

Lauching, he declined to comment when asked to give the date of the next general election. However, he promised notice would be given when the time came. He said consideration of the negotiations with the United Kingdom on the price of Canadian wheat exported to that country in the year beginning next August is in progress in London and Ottawa.

The Prime Minister announced the following appointments: J. A. Glen, former Resources Minister and one-time Speaker of the Commons, to the International Joint Commission succeeding the late Charles Stuart. Mr. Glen resigned his seat in Marquette to make way for the new Justice Minister, Stuart Garson, who was victorious there in last Monday's voting.

Roy T. Graham, former deputy clerk of the Commons, to the Saskatchewan Court of King's Bench, and to be chairman of the Income Tax Appeals Board for a year while it is being organized on a judicial basis.

Fabio Monet, of Montreal, and W. Stanley Finlay, of Ottawa, to be members of the Income Tax Appeals Board.

Alexandre Boudreau of Laval University in Ste. Anne de la Patisserie, to the Civil Service Commission.

W. H. Phillips, vice president of the Order of Railway Telegraphers, to the OBC board of governors for a three-year term replacing Edward B. Chase.

Mr. St. Laurent said the necessity of getting quickly to work on the Newfoundland union legislation prompted him to call Parliament on a Wednesday instead of the traditional Thursday.

He had not yet reached the other Party leaders for discussion of the procedure, but hoped to do so after the Christmas holiday.

He said he hoped soon to announce the set up of a royal commission to investigate Canadian transportation. Former Justice W. G. A. Turgeon, now high commissioner in Dublin, is expected to head the commission. Mr. Turgeon is still in Dublin; the Prime Minister replied to a query on that report.

Sentences Imposed By Stipendiary Magistrate

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court yesterday, Earl J. Phillips, City, appearing on a preliminary hearing before Magistrate K. M. Martin on a charge of theft of \$90 in cash, was committed for trial to the Supreme Court. The theft occurred on December 11th from a room at the Revere Hotel. Two other cases of theft were heard, one of merchandise under \$25, and one of money, both were heard, and the latter remanded until December 29th.

Two men charged with attempted theft of goods not exceeding \$25 were also remanded until today. Five men charged with vagrancy (fighting) were all remanded until December 30th on \$20 bail each. Two cases under the Temperance Act were heard, one being dismissed and the other was withdrawn at the request of the prosecution. A drunk and disorderly was remanded for one week and a drunk and incapable was fined \$5 and costs or 10 days.

On Wednesday, Elizabeth Lawless, city, appearing before the Magistrate was convicted and sentenced to two years in penitentiary for uttering five forged cheques amounting to approximately \$100. The cheques had been passed re-
