YESTERDAY morning the Legislature did not meet until a late hour owing to the visit of the members to the Stock Farm and Asylum. There are now on the farm in Ayrshire cattle 15 cows, 3 two year old heifers, 3 yearlings and one bull. In Shortborns there are 22 cows, 3 two year old heifers, 3 yearling and 3 bulls including the two new importations, Triumph and Patriotic. The last two animals came in for much praise, and were considered worthy of heading any herd in America. They were both a year old last October, and are therefore of a proper age for limited service in the spring. On the whole there is a splendid herd of cattle, but the animals are not now looking their best as many of the cows have calved recently and are therefore at their worst. In swine there are 2 Yorkshire sows, 1 boar, and 1 Tamworth sow. There are four working horses kept on the farm, but none for breeding purposes. There is every convenience for feeding stock, and one great improvement is the presence of a large elevated tank for watering purposes, which is kept over the main cow stable, and being surrounded by hay, there is no danger of freezing.
