### 50,000 scouts. The splendid manner

in which the boys marched past the royal box, the announcement by the Prince of Wales that the chief scoutmaster was made Lord Baden-Powell, the visit of such notables as the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Duke of Connaught and Cardinal Bourne, were subjects of special comment. The speaker also described the scene of the burying of the hatchet symbolizing the outlary of war. With regard to the scout movement in general, Mr. Stiles described briefly some of the psychological functions of the child in each of three stages known in the scout world as Wolf Cubs, Scouts, and Rovers. A sense of shame is not developed in a child till the age of twelve, and attempts to reach this sense before that age may result in the destruction of self-confidence. The youth of sixteen to eighteen years rebels against precedent. If it were not otherwise there would be no advancement in the human race. One of the scout's mottos is "A scout's honour is to be trusted," not "Scouts must not do anything dishonourable." Positive teaching is stressed. Scouting is based on three principles, fidelity to God, to the church, and to the king, obedience to scout laws, and the practice of helping others.

### In answer to a question as to why

troops fail Mr. Stiles stated that the reason usually is because the scoutmaster has not the information which the troop demands because of lack of appreciation for the work of the scoutmaster.

Mr. W. L. Currier outlined briefly the Scout organization. Great care should be taken that nothing break the routine of work. A troop committee consisting of three persons over the age of twenty one should supervise the work of the group.

Mr. Stiles stated that boys from eight years to twelve belong to the herd class, boys from twelve to sixteen to the gang stage and the older boys to the pal stage. The motto for parents of children of the gang stage should be, "Time for and interest in the thing your boy is interested in."

### Rev. G. T. Spriggs explained that

the chief difficulty of the Island is in the matter of finance, and the consequent difficulty of securing expert knowledge. Relative to the former difficulty Mr. Stiles said that money could be drawn from the larger centres to support the weaker such as in the Maritime Provinces. The money usually used for training, about \$500, could be used for field work. "Scout work will gradually come," he said, "it is inevitable, and the work is very necessary."

### Mr. Parent, Provincial Secretary,

read the program which Mr. Stiles will follow while on the Island. He will meet Governor Hertzog, Chief Patron of the scouts, this morning. At 4 p. m. he will be with the Cubs at St. Peter's and from 6 p. m. till 7 he will address the Y's Men's Club, and afterwards the Zion Church Scouts. On Friday he will go to Summerside where he will have a conference with Premier Saunders. Mayor Lidstone and Mr. A. E. McLean, Saturday morning Mr. Stiles will visit Kensington and Saturday evening will meet a rally of troops in Zion Church. Sunday he will address the Baptist and Central Christian Sunday Schools. Sunday evening the Y. M. C. A. Singing, and Monday noon the Rotary Club.

keeper George A. Durnford, seized Warden Edgar S. Jennings and several other keepers and held them as hostages for the release of about twelve ringleaders of the mutiny. With the walls entirely surrounded by National Guard soldiers with loaded guns, city officials ordered the front gate of the prison opened at noon and sent word to the convicts to file out. Because of fear that the guards would be killed the authorities hesitated to attack.

Warden Jennings sent a message through a trustee to the police, urging "for God's sake give them what they want." Lieut. Solway Perry of Troop G, commanding the Troopers declared, "The Warden will have to take his chances; if they come out we will mow them down. If they don't come out before a load of tear gas we have ordered gas here, we will go in anyway and we will go in shooting."

AUBURN, N. Y., Dec. 11 - The death list in the Auburn prison riot was unofficially placed at 12 early tonight. Three convicts died in the heavy fighting incidental to the rescue of the captured prison officials, two died in skirmishes during the reoccupation by guards and police and six fell under machine gun fire in a "mopping up" procedure. Principal Keeper George A. Durnford was shot at the outbreak of the trouble, while resisting the attack of a group of convicts.
