Messrs. McNutt, Arsenault, Matthews And Peters Present Government's Case In Most Effective Manner To Electors Of Their Constituencies.

Hon. A. F. Arsenault and Hon. Thomas MacNutt were accorded a great reception in Spring Valley at the joint political meeting. Mr. Connick very capably presided and excellent order prevailed. Mr. Arsenault was warmly applauded when speaking on Old Age pensions, showing how the MacMillan Government had taken advantage of the offer of the Government at Ottawa and by giving to the people of the province the Old Age pension many were able to remain in their homes and enjoy the comforts they are entitled to in the evening of life.

Hon. Thomas MacNutt also referred to many instances where the old age pension has proved a great boon to many an old couple. During his canvass he had come across many who have admitted they could not have got along without it last winter.

Mr. Gallant and Mr. Linkletter made their usual criticisms of the MacMillan Government but had nothing of a constructive nature to offer the electors. Their criticisms were ably replied to by the Conservative candidates.

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LITTLE GIRL RUN OVER BY MOTOR CAR

Dorothy Clow, Aged 3, Taken To Prince County Hospital In Serious Condition.

Dorothy Clow, three-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Clow of Summerside was taken to the Prince County Hospital in a very serious condition when she received severe head injuries after being run over by a motor car about 3:30 yesterday afternoon. Mr. William Albert Moose of Kensington was proceeding along First St. and when opposite the White Star Laundry the little girl ran out from the sidewalk which is very narrow at this point and was knocked down by the car. The front and rear wheels passed over the child's body. Her head evidently struck the concrete. Eye witnesses said that the child was looking the other way and stepped immediately in front of the car. A test of the car brakes were taken and found to be in perfect condition. Mr. Moose said he did not see the child at all. Statements were taken of eye-witnesses and the Crown prosecutor ordered the release of Mr. Moose pending further developments. The little girl's condition is very grave.—S.

Campaign Issues Are Discussed At Malpeque Meeting

As is usual at Malpeque there was a very large attendance at the joint political meeting on Thursday. All the speakers were given an attentive hearing. The audience had come there to hear the issues of the campaign discussed and by their attitude displayed keen interest in the arguments. Mr. Wm. Ramsay very capably presided.

Mr. E. Marin Gallant Mr. Gallant, Liberal candidate was the first speaker and after thanking the electors for supporting him eight years ago, he said that everyone knows that the present Government had to spend a 1 1/2 more than it would have under ordinary conditions, but that they could have been more careful. They seemed to have followed the lines of the least resistance.

They have lately started on an orgy of expenditure and all this debt will have to be paid for. It is true the Liberals spent a good deal of money, but they left something to the people on their record and went down to defeat not because they spent too much money, but because the Bennett Government had promised so much.

The present Government has been extravagant, he claimed. They had to spend a good deal of money on relief and if things do not get better relief will have to be extended. But they have bungled the finances; if the Liberals are elected they will make an honest effort to balance the budget and allot to each department a certain amount and try to keep expenditures within bounds, he stated.

Hon. Adrien F. Arsenault Mr. Arsenault was in splendid form for the final meeting of his district.

He did not think there was very much in the Liberal platform, and it has been very difficult for the electors at the various meetings to know just what they will do if elected.

As stated by my opponent, Mr. Gallant, we took office we found certain conditions there. A debt of \$1,177,000, in good times, and what have they given us, \$366,000 dollars of imported gravel on our roads. The greater part of the money has gone in Nova Scotia.

Mr. Gallant claims that the Liberal Government knew of the gravel on the Island in 1928, but, said Mr. Arsenault, "what does Premier Saunders say?" "We have not one single ounce of gravel in the Province since 1928, he said. They discovered the gravel pits they still continued importing gravel.

Mr. Arsenault went on to say they want to claim everything, they even want to take away from the Women's Institutes the credit for building the Sanatorium. These people who are so careful of the public health let the Dalton Sanatorium go to such a bad state of repair that it was no use.

The Conservatives had given more than \$100,000 to assist the Women's Institutes in building the Sanatorium.

Mr. MacIntyre, when Minister of Public Works ordered \$90,000 worth of road machinery over the telephone, and yet the Liberals say they are going to control expenses. How can they when they let one man have full scope to order recklessly over the telephone to the tune of such an enormous sum.

Answering Mr. Gallant's claim that the building of Falconwood would cost, if according to the original plans, one quarter and one million dollars.

Mr. Arsenault said, "he has no right to say that as the tenders were never opened, but the estimate of the architect was one million."

"The Liberals now blame us because we did not go ahead and use the plans. The people know that to take advantage of the unemployment grants from Ottawa we had to spend large sums of money on relief."

Mr. Arsenault contrasted their record with that of the Liberal Government. It is true they had increased the debt \$927,300 but they had the new Falconwood Hospital and Prince of Wales College as permanent assets.

In addition they had given large sums for direct and unemployment relief.

Not only all that but \$75,000 from the Carnegie Foundation and public libraries. Then they say, oh that's nothing. We did not get much. Well what did they get? (Applause)

In ex-Premier Saunders' letter to Mackenzie King, then Prime Minister of Canada, he said it will be a long time before this province could bear the burden of laying permanent roads and yet the Liberals say this government has been extravagant for getting the Bennett Government to assist with the highway construction is costing \$11,600 per mile, the MacIntyre highway cost \$27,000 per mile, and yet they still want to investigate cheaper roadmaking. They are so inconsistent.

Mr. Arsenault stressed the fact that Premier Mathieson re-opened the door of the subsidy claims and got \$100,000 when no other province was able to claim anything.

The Liberals will even say they got the subsidy. Premier Saunders in 1927 received \$120,000. The Liberals did little to press their claims at Ottawa; all they got was a discouraging reply from Mackenzie King. Mr. Arsenault went on showing up the Liberals inconsistency.

He said Mr. Claire Campbell will no doubt explain the subsidy question and why it was that ex-Premier Saunders did not succeed when he went to Ottawa. In his letter Mr. Saunders admits that he refused to co-operate with the Premiers of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

"But I have yet to hear an explanation which satisfies me," Mr. Arsenault said. (Applause)

The Liberals try to hide their indebtedness by charging gravel and road machinery to the capital account; that is the way they balanced their budget, charging to capital account things that are not permanent. They had charged to capital account in their four years of office \$366,170.34 worth of gravel.

We had a perfect right to charge to capital account the money expended on Prince of Wales College and Falconwood Hospital. They are permanent assets.

Mr. Arsenault closed with an appeal for himself and colleagues to be returned on election day and for the MacMillan Government.

Splendid Hearing For Conservatives At Kensington

Issues Of Campaign Ably Presented By Government Spokesmen.

Over 1,800 people heard the political issues discussed last night in Kensington rink where Mr. Walter M. Lea made his first appearance on a public platform during the campaign.

The Conservative candidates received a splendid hearing and enthusiastic applause.

Mayor Leard presided and in spite of the vast crowds excellent order prevailed. Besides the candidates Hon. G. Shelton Sharp and Mr. A. E. MacLean, M.P., addressed the meeting.

Mr. Heath Strong Mr. Heath Strong expressed pleasure at having the privilege of addressing this meeting, the largest in the campaign. In a trenchant speech he referred to the unprecedented depression which was general all over the world at the time the present government came into office. Not only had they to face depression world wide, but they had to cope with the tremendous debts of over one million dollars that the Lea administration had left behind. They were also faced with the necessity of providing assistance to the farmers and fishermen. The Liberal candidates say they are going to make revenue and expenditure meet and yet they are the same aggregation who left such a tremendous debt when they went out of office. In conclusive language Mr. Strong laid emphasis on the fact that it was the Conservative government of the province who had obtained the subsidy amounts.

The Mathieson government was the first government that had obtained an increase in subsidy claims. Premier MacMillan by his persistence and energy appointed the White Commission and obtained \$150,000 annually for all time for this province. The Liberals under the Saunders government made such a poor presentation of our claims that they got nothing. Besides that the Conservatives got money for unemployment relief, direct relief, old age pensions and money to continue our highway policy. The government realized that the only enues of work for our youth in the United States were closed and therefore it was the duty of this government to provide work for the young men of the country, and through obtaining extra money from Ottawa they were able to build this highway, thus providing the necessary work. Mr. Strong touched on the overdraft and Falconwood plans which had been so criticized by the opposition. Mr. Strong's able address was received with thunderous applause lasting for some minutes.

Mr. Horace Wright Mr. Horace Wright, charging the government with bungling on their finances, stated that he never heard of the bank closing down on the government. "The bank had never told us when we were in overdraft," he said. "Is it reasonable to suppose that the bank insisted that the overdraft must be paid off? We never heard of it."

Mr. Wright then went on to discuss the subsidy question, belittling the sums which the Conservative government had obtained and bragging that had it not been for the Liberals there would have been no Duncan Commission or White Commission. Being interrupted by a curt "What money did you get," Mr. Wright sidestepped the question and went at some length into federal politics.

Mr. Morrison Mr. Hugh Morrison, who followed Mr. Wright, warmly welcomed Mr. Walter M. Lea and expressed the wishes of the vast audience that Mr. Lea would soon be restored to his accustomed vigor and good health. Mr. Morrison received much applause as he ably compared the present government record with the sorry record of the Liberal government, who had admittedly good times rolled up a tremendous debt for this country.

"The Liberals are coming to you now with a platform of a balanced budget. They cannot do it," he said. "There are only three ways to do it. First to stop all public works, second to raise taxes and third to obtain more subsidies. If they try the first they will have a rebellion on their hands, if they try the second they will be put out of power quicker than Jerry wrote

Pensions. It is quite easy to legislate, but it is of no benefit unless put into effect. (Cheers)

Mr. Arnett was rather surprised that Mr. Linkletter, who poses as a friend of the fishermen, should find fault with the extension of the lobster fishing season. The Government had done its best to help the fishermen but it was no fault of the Government that there were no lobster

Mr. W. M. Lea Mr. W. M. Lea expressed regret that his illness had prevented him from appearing before "Four years ago we were criticized for our extravagance," he said. "Times were prosperous then and we had insistent demands for public works as we found the roads in terrible condition. There have been some notorious misrepresentations of the Liberal government," he said. He then went on to criticize the present government for their extravagance and road policy. Mr. Lea did not, however, say anything about his own policy except to say that he was alarmed by the debt that the present government could expect to get any more from Ottawa with the Dominion government in its present state. "They have no more chance than we had," he said. "They would not cooperate with us or we could have got more subsidy than they did." He closed his remarks by appealing to the electors for himself and Mr. Baker for their support.

Hon. G. Shelton Sharp comparing the record of the two governments showed that the Liberals did not implement one of the planks of their platform which they went in on in 1927 and on which they were defeated in 1931 because they had not kept their promises and moreover they had left it to the Conservatives in 1931 to implement their platform. They were going to get the subsidy and give old age pensions, but they left these things to the present government to obtain. "They will not give you any better government," he said, "as they are the same fellows as you put out in 1931. They would treat you like a lot of sheep. Just because the other provinces had gone Liberal they would have you believe that this province should do so. I place before you our record, if you think we have carried on the affairs of the province to the best of our ability then do not let them stampede you, like a lot of sheep, but vote as your intelligence tells you for a government who has done more for the province than any other government since Confederation."

A few hoodlums tried to disturb Mr. Sharp while he was talking but they were effectively silenced when Mr. Pendergast appeared to the chairman to call in the police. It had the desired effect and Mr. Sharp went on amid the cheers of the audience.

Mr. Sharp answered very effectively the question of Mr. Lea that if the conditions of Falconwood were as bad as Mr. Sharp would have you believe, "why did his government not make this charge on the floor of the House?" Mr. Sharp stated his government did not have to make the charge as Dr. Fleming and Dr. Mitchell made it on the eve of the fire. "We did not press the point," he said, "but you can read the report which was tabled in the House and I say my statement is substantially correct."

Mr. Sharp ably defended his government with us or we could have got more subsidy than they did." He closed his remarks by appealing to the electors for himself and Mr. Baker for their support.

Mr. C. C. Baker followed Mr. Sharp. Mr. A. E. MacLean took part of Mr. Baker's time and spoke on federal matters to a large extent however. The hour was getting late and the audience began to leave while Mr. MacLean was speaking. The meeting, which was the largest political meeting of the campaign, closed with the National Anthem. S.
