PAY PENALTY

(Special to the Guardian) MEXICO CITY, March 1.—Sixteen Mexicans have paid with their lives for the alleged murder last week of W. M. Underwood and G. C. Afsethrope, American mining officials, in the state of Guanajuato. Two others, held as prisoners, today faced summary action by court martial and probable execution, for their part in the slayings. Troops were in pursuit of the remainder of the band.

The military commander of the state of Guanajuato reported to the chief of the presidential staff here, that federal troops yesterday encountered the bandit group, and in a two hour battle killed ten of them, capturing two others. Six others were killed in a previous battle. One federal soldier was killed in yesterday's encounter.

STEAM UP FOR LONDON



This model, a perfect working miniature of one of the Canadian National Railways' giant locomotives, is now on its way to London, England, where it will be exhibited in the European offices of the National system. John E. Wood, of Winnipeg, constructed it in his spare time, and it took him fourteen months of diligence and skill. The main frames and some of the other parts were made by apprentices in the Fort Rouge and Transcona shops. The model is correct in all external details and will work under its own power. The boiler has been tested to 150 pounds pressure. For the purposes of exhibition a motor was placed in the oak base to drive the wheels through a worm gear on the main driving axle. The over-all length of the model is eight feet, six inches, while the over-all length of the original #100 is 94 feet, six inches. The model weighs approximately 275 pounds and the super-locomotive 326 tons.



Prominent women of Halifax, enrolling themselves as members of the Halifax branch of the Canadian Red Cross, are doing a national work at the Ocean Terminals in Halifax, where they have extensive facilities for caring for immigrant women and children.

When these buildings were erected by the Canadian National Railways, they having since been turned over to the Halifax Harbor Commission, a suite of rooms was set aside in the large passenger ticketing building, and furnished for the particular work that these Red Cross women desired to do. The suite contains a dormitory and nursery combined, where women and children may rest; a large lounge room, where children have a nursery, where their mothers and fathers may read and write, and also have light lunches. They also have lavatories and toilet rooms where children may be bathed and cared for, and they are also equipped for rendering first aid and giving light hospital attention.

Work done by these ladies is entirely voluntary and a visitor to the Immigration Pier, when ships are in port, may see these sisters of the Red Cross working day and night.
