Chalk Up 10-2 Win Over Souris Team In Final Game Of Series

Chick Williams' Abegweits last night advanced into the finals for the Island intermediate hockey title when they defeated Souris Legionaires 10-2 in the second and final game of the home and home series, taking the round by a 22-9 count after winning the opening game played at Souris 12-7.

Faster skaters and far more polished, the Abbies shot four more goals without a return in the opening period; outscored their opponent 2-1 in a tightly played middle chukker and came on again in the third to have a 4-1 edge to account for their victory.

As the score would indicate, the local squad had a big edge over the King's County champions and but for the brilliant work of Pierce in the visitors net would have piled up a much larger count; but the Souris net janitor kicked out a ton of rubber during the game to draw down the plaudits of the crowd on many occasions. Souris tried hard all the way through and in the second session played on even terms with their opponents, but couldn't cash in on their chances as passes went astray or shots went wild but their supporters for their game display in a losing cause.

Higson Gets Five

Leading the winner's attack last night was swivel-hipped Johnny Higson, first string center with five goals followed by Pud Beer and LeClair with two apiece with the remaining one going to Art Perry. For Souris, Lewis and McCormack were the goalgetters. The latter player was outstanding in the Souris cause breaking up many plays in his defence position and in addition to scoring the second counter drawing an assist on the first goal of the losers.

Abbies now meet Summerside All Stars in the finals with the first game scheduled for Summerside ice on Saturday night and the deciding encounter back at the Forum on the following Monday.

Checking closely and with their goals coming through with a couple of brilliant saves, Souris held the Abbies at bay for over eight minutes of the first period but at 8:32 Joey LeClair found the range when he backhanded the disc home on a pass from Art Perry. The goal set off the Abbies' scoring spark and before the period had ended they came through with three additional counters. Perry setting the second one and Higson scoring twice in the space of two minutes and 20 seconds in the latter part of the period.

Abbies struck early in the second with Higson getting his third goal at 2:20 but for the next fifteen minutes, Souris, fighting back hard, held the Abbies on even terms as both teams missed chances when in close. At 17:42 Pud Beer made it 6-0 as he and LeClair pulled off a smart passing play and forty seconds later the losers got their first goal as McCormack, after carrying from his defence post passed to Lewis who beat Cudmore cleanly.

McCormack worked in alone a minute and five seconds after the start of the third session to shoot Souris' second goal on a smart play but before the halfway mark had been reached, Abbies came back with three more counters to build up a 9-2 lead as Beer, Higson and LeClair beat the overworked

Souris netminder. Summoning their forces for a last desperate effort, Souris took control of the play in the latter stages to hem the Abbies in but failed to add to their total although they did make Cudmore come through with three sparking saves on one occasion to keep his cage clear of rubber.

As a parting salute, Abbies fired the final goal, Higson teaming up with Perry and Beer at 18:58 of the session to slide the disc in after Pierce had saved twice in a row.
