Address And Presentation To Dr. J.A. Murchison

Doctor John A. Murchison of Bonshaw, after nearly half a century of close attention to his profession, decided to take a two months vacation visiting his family and friends in Seattle. He was not in the secret of what his neighbors were going to do about it. When, on return from a sick visit, on Friday evening, he saw a great crowd of people around his doorway, no one can blame him for suspecting a serious accident had taken place. It was the surprise of his life.

Almost the whole population of Bonshaw, and many others, had turned out to give a practical demonstration of how the Doctor had endeared himself to the community. Never in his career, at any time or any hour of the night, has he neglected a call for help, and always in social enterprises he took a leading part. And now, on the eve of a well deserved rest, his friends were going to let him know how they feel about it.

The gathering, numbering about two hundred, was presided over by Captain L. T. Beaton. Appropriate speeches were delivered by Messrs J. J. McLeod, Allen Stewart, ex-M. L. A., Chester Shaw and others. Music and other entertainments were enjoyed, followed by ice cream and refreshments in a generous supply. The address to Dr. Murchison was read by Mr. Albert McDougall, to which the Doctor replied in feeling appreciation, as well as surprise, over the unexpected event. After lustily singing that old song of friendship: "For he's a jolly good fellow," and with hand shakes and best wishes, the company dispersed.

In presenting a magnificent hand bag, and a purse of money, Mr. A. McDougall read the address as follows:

"John A. Murchison, Esq. M. D., Bonshaw, P. I. Island.
"Dear Doctor Murchison:
"For not many years short of half a century it has been the pleasure of the people of Bonshaw and vicinity to enjoy the friendships of you and your esteemed lady partner in life.

The worship for the day began with the singing by the congregation of "All people that on earth do dwell sing to the Lord with cheerful voice" and the day closed with "We stand to bless thee ere our worship cease, then, lowly kneeling, wait thy word of peace."

On completion of six years of union, the Moderator issued a message of gratitude and hope, in which he says:

"I have visited our Church from coast to coast. I have seen it in action in pioneer settlement and frontier mission and stately city church. It has never been more magnificent than at this moment in vision and sympathy, in sacrificial spirit and consciousness of unity.

Robbins, Somerville, Mass., Mrs. Alvin Myers, Hazelbrook while the sons are Warren on the old homestead, Lorne Hazlet, Sask. Colin and Chester, Somerville, Mass. Those residing in the United States made a hurried trip home by automobile to pay their last respects at the funeral. Mr. Acorn is survived also by one brother, Charles Hermitage, and two sisters, Mary Ann, Hermitage and Mrs. Harriett Horton, Village Green.

The funeral was held at the late residence on Tuesday, July 21st, being very largely attended. The Rev. H. E. Campbell, Pownall and Rev. Ewen MacDougall, Charlottetown, officiating. Interment in the family plot at Pownall Cemetery. Pallbearers were Alfred D. Brehaut, William Jackman, James Noy, William Doyle, Nell Munn, Venanches Curley. The many floral tributes and messages of sympathy received bore silent testimony to the esteem in which the deceased was held.

TRINITY UNITED CHURCH

The British House of Commons has rejected the proposal to allow theatres to open on Sundays. The London Times commenting on the matter says "a very large proportion of our people are not unconscious of the ultimate claims on which the institution of Sunday rests, or willing to sacrifice an influence which, from every point of view, has proved of immense value in the history of our nation."
