CANADIENS WHEELERS LOSE ARE BADLY CRIPPLED

Lepine and Joliat Likely Out Of Game Tonight With Rangers.

NEW YORK, N. Y., Mar. 28.—The depleted ranks of Montreal's Canadiens tonight looked upon the murk and mist of a rain-drenched Manhattan and figured their chances to capture their third successive National Hockey League title and the Stanley Cup.

Faced with the loss of Fit Lepine, crafty centre player, who suffered a broken bone in his right leg in last night's game, and the almost certain absence of Auréli Joliat from left wing through a severe foot injury, the "Habitués" refuse to be counted out.

FOUL PLAY SUSPECTED

ROCKLAND, Ont., March 28. (By the Canadian Press)—Exhumation of the body of Agnès Lamarche, 20, drowned in a car which plunged off the Masson, Que., wharf on Oct. 4, 1930, loomed as a possibility tonight as provincial police continued their investigation on the farm of William J. Larocque, on March 18.

Inspector William Stringer, of Toronto, intimated Lamarche's body may be exhumed from its grave at Sarsfield, Ont. He has been investigating Lamarche's movements prior to his death, of which William Larocque and Emmanuel Lavictoire, who were with Bergeron when he was killed, were witnesses. No autopsy was held on Lamarche's body a verdict of accidental death being returned on the evidence of Larocque and Lavictoire.

No decision on the matter of exhumation will be made, however, until after the inquest into Bergeron's death, now set for April 4.

Today Inspector Stringer and his aides went to Navan, Ont., where several persons were examined and then journeyed to Rockland where Felix Lamarche, father of Agnès, was questioned regarding his financial dealings during the past year.

WHEELERS LOSE TO WOLVES 3-0

MAPLE LEAF GARDENS, Toronto, Ont., March 28. (By the Canadian Press)—Sudbury's Wolves howled tonight in victorious glee. A sterling young band of hockey-ists, as crafty as the denizens of the north country they are called after, defeated just as gallant a band of Montreal Winged Wheelers by 3-0 here tonight to win the Eastern Canada Junior championship.

Tonight's concluding game was a terrific struggle—an epic of puck chasing and a classic of roaring hockey. All three goals were scored in the second period when Sudbury had full command of the play throughout.

Record Flight

CAPE TOWN, South Africa, Mar. 28. — (By the Canadian Press Cable via Reuters) —Blazing his own trail, J. A. Mollison, youthful Australian aviator, set a new record for the flight from England to Capetown this evening.

He cracked up his light machine on the beach after overshooting the landing ground, but he was not injured, and was driven back to the aerodrome where a large crowd had been waiting to greet him.

Mollison reached Cape Town 4 days, 17 hours and 19 minutes after taking off at Lympne aerodrome, England. The former record was five days and eight hours, set by Peggy Salaman and Gordon Store of London, last November.

Ignoring the main Empire route which has just been put into operation southward from London, travelling 6,250 miles, 800 miles shorter than the route taken by Miss Salaman and Store. Mollison's route took him for 2,000 miles across the Sahara Desert after which he came down the west coast, whereas the London-Cape Town air mail route follows the East coast.

After resting a bit, Mollison, always calm and collected, said he had slept very little on the way and the bad landing was caused by his miscalculation through weariness. As a matter of fact he flew practically without sleep, and kept his machine in the air all Friday, Saturday and Sunday right. He averaged about 1,400 miles a day.
