## IRISH AFFAIRS DISCUSSED IN BRITISH HOUSE OF COMMONS

Motion to Cut Down Secretary's Salary—Redmond Attacks Wyndham's Official Work—Official Reply is that there Will Be no Present Change.

LONDON, July 23.—The House of Commons tonight entered on a series of Irish debates. When the estimates for Ireland came up for discussion John Redmond, chairman of the Irish parliamentary party, moved the reduction of the salary of the chief secretary, George Wyndham. Mr. Redmond maintained that Mr. Wyndham had done nothing for the country and that the Irish problem was more dangerous to the Empire today than it has been for a quarter of a century. Mr. Wyndham, in refuting this assertion, declared he could at present offer no constructive policy and maintained that there could be no cessation of agrarian strife, no revival of industry and no staunching of the flow of immigration, and the union must become intolerable to the Unionists and the idea of home rule impossible even to those who cherished it, unless and until the desolating process of social proscription and the miasma of fear which penetrated every nerve of national life were repudiated by the good sense of the people and repressed by the power of the government. Mr. Wyndham's accusation that T. W. Russell (Liberal-Unionist), member for

South Tyrone, palliated disorder during the De Freyne evictions, brought out a heated denial from Mr. Russell, and lengthy exchanges between himself and Mr. Wyndham.

Sir Charles Dilke, M. P. (Advanced Radical, and former under secretary of state for foreign affairs), answering a suggestion that parliament inquire into the increasing inroads made by American combines in Great Britain, writes that while special circumstances make the acquisition of British shipping by foreigners deserving of public attention, he fails to see any reason why the investment of American capital in other industries should be discouraged, adding: "It appears to be unamixed good to us that, under the strict parliamentary control which our private bill system gives, American capital and enterprises should be engaged in railroad work."

LONDON, July 23.—Mr. Russell declared that only a man who had sold himself body and soul to the landlords and evictors would dare make such an accusation. Dealing with the formation of the Irish Land Trust, Mr. Russell said it would provoke a war, the end of which no man could foresee.

### THE EDITOR'S MAIL. EPHRAIMITES.

I agree with the writer that it would be much better if the importation of liquor were stopped. But even if that were the case, if eternal vigilance were not used and the people became indifferent as they now are to the enforcement of our Provincial Law, how long would it be before the country would be deluged with smuggled rum?

What we need is to enforce the law we have. We'll get a better one after a time. A galling sun is better than a bow. And I claim that the law is educative. Its school-master to lead to better conditions. I believe also in educative work. Let there be education in the home, in the church, and in society, and let us ask God to bless our labors, but He won't bless inactivity. Its slow work however, educates the rum-seller.

The Law was given for just such men, (it was made for the lawless). Whilst we are trying moral suasion and other means, they are busy educating our boys to drink, and leading them to ruin.

In conversation with a respectable man a short time ago he said, "You men seem to have gotten hold of the wrong end of this question. You cannot curb this evil with law." At that very time his own son was being led away into the paths of unrighteousness through drink. He said to me afterwards, when he discovered that his son was ruined, "Its slow work educating those people. I fear it can't be done."

One great regret is that many workers are becoming discouraged, when they witness such scenes as Mr. Bremner has in our City of late. All the more need for aggressive work. Let us lift up the hands that are hanging down, and the feeble knees, and make straight paths for the feet, for lame ones are being turned out of the way. But let them rather be healed. Provincial Prohibition and Scott Act if well enforced are great healers. We have seen this proved in our own Country.

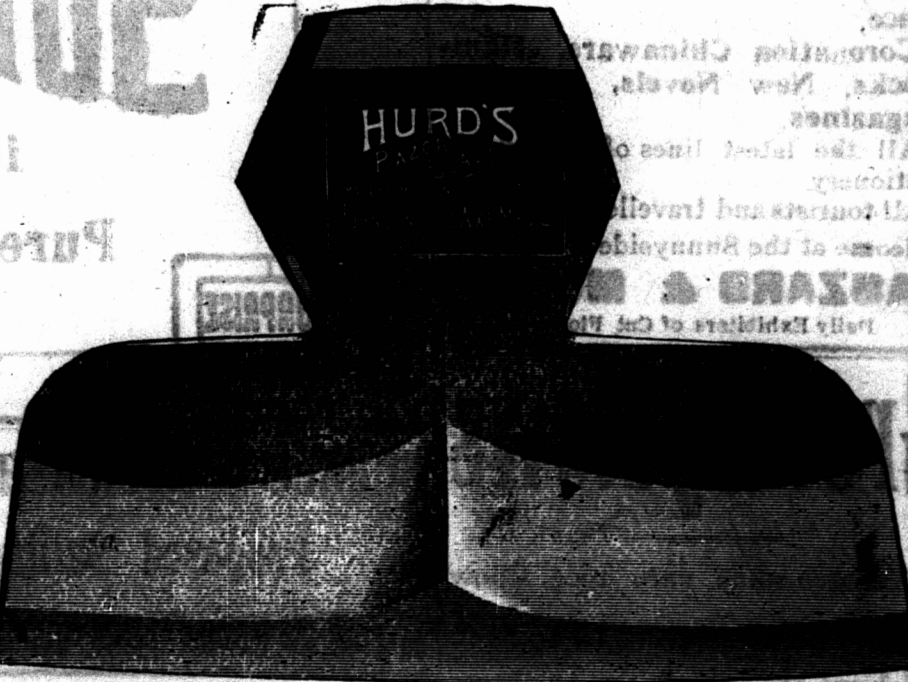
