BRAVE CHAPLAINS.

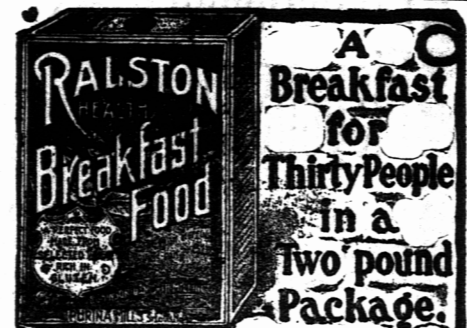
Distinguished Themselves at the Front.

Private Nickle, Montreal, First Contingent, invalided home from South Africa, in the course of an interview, expressed great admiration for the Rev. Father O'Leary, the Roman Catholic chaplain, and the Rev. Mr. Almond, the Anglican one, particularly the former, though both of those clergymen did much to endear themselves to the men. Father O'Leary made himself at home with the men in the march and in camp. Once he marched along for some distance with E. company, displaying a Mauser rifle and remarking, "A nice carnal kind of a weapon this for the church militant to be armed with."
When the men got tired and discouraged he would say, "come on, boys; now buck up. We have got to see this thing through for the honor of Canada, you know." And Mr. Almond was generally with him, and was a good sort too, cheering the men, encouraging them to write home, and often doing it for them. Father O'Leary, of the three chaplains, was alone at Paardeberg, and buried all the Canadian dead, reading the burial service out of the Church of England prayer-book he borrowed from Nickle. He borrowed this in the fighting line. Surprised at the priest asking for the prayer-book at such a time, Nickle asked him what he wanted it for, and the good man explained that young Waddell was shot, and apparently dying, and that he thought it his duty to do what he could for his soul. He remarked, "It will comfort the poor fellow to hear a few words from some of the prayers of his own church, even if the priest who reads them belongs to another."
Nickle said he did not know until afterwards that it was the anniversary of Majuba day, and if any of his comrades of the Royal Canadians knew he did not hear any of them make any remark about it. He is inclined to think that none of the men of the regiment knew what day it was.

How Christianity Blesses India

A fine testimony as to the change wrought in the very appearance of converts from heathenism through the influence of Christianity comes from Louis Klopsch, of New York, who went out to India in the interest of The Christian Herald's Famine Relief Fund, and has just returned. Incidentally, too he bears testimony to the promptness and thoroughness with which the Indian Government is dealing with the suffering through relief works.

"I could not help noticing the tremendous difference which Christianity produces in mankind. Here, on the one side rough, coarse, unkept, uncouth, haggard, and wan-looking creatures, constantly furling on their faces at your feet, adjuring you to give them help, and paying all manner of flattering and fawning compliments, ready apparently to sell their very lives for a few coppers; and on the other hand the clean, bright, clear-eyed, neatly dressed, and intelligent native family that seemed to rise head and shoulders above all that surrounded them. On the one hand, Mussulmans and Hindus, and on the other hand, children of the Lord. I have as yet no opinion to express; I have no criticisms to make, except with regard to the employment of women and children. One or two visits to the camp will not suffice to furnish that light necessary to intelligently criticise the tremendous charity which the Anglo-Indian Government is conducting. I will say, that as a rule, people talk very highly of the Government, and my own opinion is that an impartial person cannot help being tremendously impressed at the stupendous proportions of this God-imposed responsibility, which is unquestionably the most splendid object-lesson bearing on the white man's burden which the world has ever witnessed."

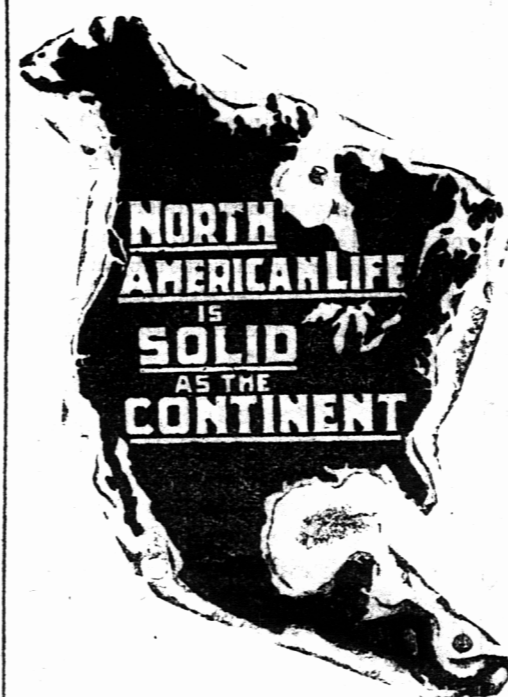
