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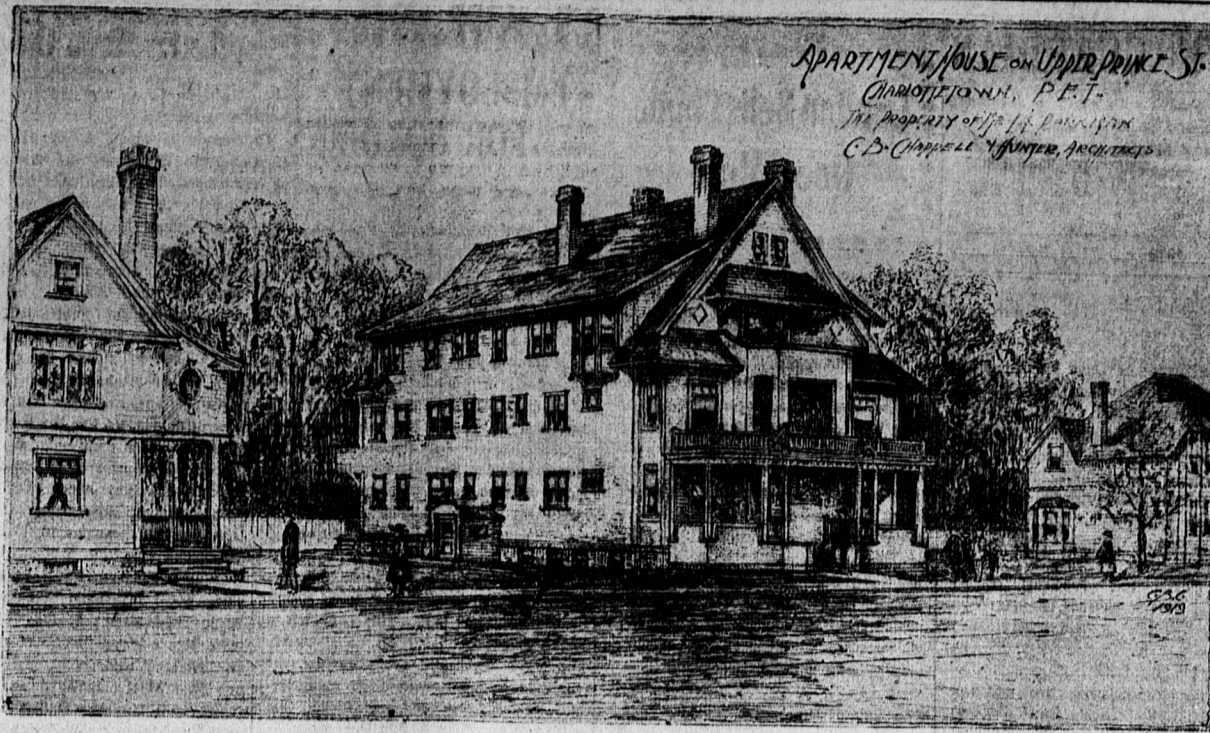

APARTMENT HOUSE ON UPPER PRINCE ST. CHARLOTTETOWN, P.E.I. The property of J. H. Parkman, C.B. Chartered Accountant, Architects.

THE NEW PARKMAN APARTMENTS ON UPPER PRINCE STREET

The above sketch shows how the new apartment house which is being built on Upper Prince Street by Mr. Ernest Parkman, will look when completed.

Owing to the fine weather much progress has been made, and it is expected that by the first of May it will be ready for occupation.

The building as is well known, was formerly Grace Methodist Church and this is a case of a whole church being "converted" into an apartment house, under "Pastor" Parkman.

The building has been entirely remodelled. The southern wing has been completely removed. A large number of windows were put in and all the necessary alterations made to make it a thoroughly up-to-date apartment house, and a credit to Charlottetown.

Six families can be comfortably accommodated in the building. There will be two tenants on each floor, each tenant having his own flat, consisting of front hall, living room and dining room, pantry and kitchen, three bed rooms, with closets in each and a linen closet, making seven rooms in all. Each flat will be finished in Douglas fir, with hardwood floors in each room. The walls are covered with steel lathing, over which are three coats of plaster and lime mortar.

This material is not only durable, but ensures absolute warmth, but is also perfectly sound proof. The halls, bathroom and kitchen are painted in pleasing shades and the bedrooms all tinted. The living room and dining room, of course, will be papered according to the taste of the tenants. The wood work will be stained in light oak.

The electric fittings will be semi-direct, that is with large globes dropping from the ceiling and there will be extra fitting for reading lamps. In each kitchen is set a plate in the wall for an electric iron or other electric utensils.

In each pantry the refrigerator waste pipe is connected with the sewer pipe, so that it will drain automatically. All floors are concrete, four inches thick with an air space between making them absolutely sound proof and fire-proof.

Each kitchen contains a range supplied by Mr. Parkman. The coal is brought up by the janitor on the elevator and the ashes lowered in the same way except in the fire places where the ashes are sent to the cellar direct via the chimney.

All windows throughout the building will be fitted with green shades supplied by the owner. The main entrance is from Prince Street.

The door leading into the outer general hall is always kept locked, but this can be opened with the usual pass key and if there are any visitors it can be opened from above without the tenant coming downstairs, by an electric push button. As in every modern apartment house, there are also speaking tubes in the vestibule.

In the inner hall there is built a spare stair seat to accommodate any one waiting for a friend to descend, and upon the wall facing the door is set a large mirror, a feature which will commend itself especially to the ladies. Each apartment has its own private door, which is locked by a Yale safety lock.

Each apartment has also its own private balcony, which will be finished in the most approved style. A rear balcony extends the full length of the building; this will be divided in the centre, each tenant having a space of 9 x 17. For drying clothes, hooks can be screwed into beams in zig-zag fashion, and the lines can be set up in a few minutes.

There will be a main hoist at the rear of the building for all heavy furniture, and each flat has a rear entrance and stairway.

The whole building contains sixty-four windows in all, and the upper part of all the doors is of glass so that abundance of light will be provided.

In the basement, which has a nine foot ceiling, are four rooms for the janitor. It is heated and lighted and has a private entrance. There are two furnaces in the basement and it will be part of the janitor's duty to keep these going six months in the year, clean the back halls, and send up by the hoist the coal for the kitchen ranges and fireplaces. The coal for the range and fire place is to be provided by the tenants. The janitor's rooms will be connected by electric bells with each apartment.

This building is 80 x 35, clear of the verandahs, and is 34 feet high. The location is admirable, being in a splendid residential section of the city, and from the windows of the top flat, a fine view of the harbor can be obtained.

Mr. Parkman is to be commended on his enterprise in providing such a large and well designed apartment house for Charlottetown in these days of housing problems. It will indeed be very welcome.

When the building is fully completed and painted in harmonious colors it will be a most attractive addition to the residences of this city.

The heating and electric wiring will be installed by competent contractors.

Another Returned Hero

Among the recent arrivals from overseas is Corporal Alex Reid son of David Reid Victoria Cross. He enlisted in Edmonton in 1915 and proceeded to England with the 63rd Battalion. On arrival in England he was transferred to the 29th, better known at the firing-line as "Tobin's Tigers" with which Battalion he saw active service at the front for sixteen months. He fought at Ypres, St. Eloi, Courcellette, Vimy Ridge, Hill 70, during which time he was twice wounded, first at Courcellette (the battle of the Somme) on September 26, 1916 and later at Hill 70, (battle of Lens), to Hazel Grove in this Province.
