

CARRIE NATION IN CHARLOTTETOWN

She Arrived by the Minto on Saturday Night—Greeting at the Wharf—She will not Smash the Saloon—The Guardian Representative Interviews Her—Her Island Tour.

The famous Carrie Nation arrived by the Minto from Plover Saturday evening. She was met at the wharf by quite a number of people and followed as she drove in a carriage to the Queen Hotel by a shouting crowd of boys. Disembarking from the boat she directed her attention to a commercial man who was enjoying a cigar but who quickly withdrew it from his mouth upon her approach. The hotel was crowded and could not keep her. She telephoned to a well-known temperance worker but as he thought it was his wife speaking it was some time before she made herself intelligible to him. At this juncture the Guardian and Patriot representatives introduced themselves. Why, how d'ye do! was the greeting as the newspaper men were escorted to the sitting room where they enjoyed a half an hour's conversation with the woman whose name is perhaps more widely known than any other in America. Carrie proved an enthusiastic temperance talker. She had discarded the hatchet and was now using the Bible and burning words of denunciation of the liquor evil as the instruments of destruction to the saloon. "I'm going to lecture in Souris, Georgetown, Summerside and Alberton if dates can be arranged" she said. "I will remain in Charlottetown till Tuesday or Wednesday."

devoted and she has determined, she says, when she dies not to leave enough to bury her. "Will you meet opponents on the platform," Carrie was asked. "You can state for me if any woman will meet me on the platform I will treat her most gently and give her \$25 for discussing the question of license or prohibition." The reformer is very plainly dressed in black. She is not young, her hair being quite gray. She talks of her work at every opportunity and on the voyage held vigorous converse with the assembled passengers on the Minto. She has had two husbands but both have died. The first lived 18 months after they were married and the second who died a year ago secured a divorce when she took up the work after living with her 25 years. She was never in a dime museum and to any one who will prove he saw her in one she will give \$5. At the point the hackman announced that a carriage was awaiting her, to take her to the Windsor where Mrs. Archibald had arranged that she should stay and she bade good bye to the newspaper men for the night. In place of the famous hatchet, Mrs. Nation is now selling souvenirs. These are hatchets of white metal, with imitation pearl blades. The handle bears her name, Carry A. Nation, while the blade is set with a little brilliant. The hatchets are mounted on a card with the inscription: "Carry A. Nation, Home Defender." Another card is given with each hatchet, and it bears a photo of the woman and the following: "Government prohibit crime. Anarchy only will permit license. My darling people, for the sake of home, mother, and Heaven, use your hatchet (vote), and hold Carry A. Nation, your loving home defender, to smash saloons, and build your homes, and God will bless you." The whole outfit is sold for twenty-five cents. The noted reformer, Mrs. Nation, addressed large meetings in the Lyceum yesterday afternoon at 2.30 and in the evening at 8.30. The attendance in the evening was especially large, the hall being filled. Mrs. Nation in both addresses held the close attention of her audience as she dealt sturdy blows at the saloon and on behalf of the mothers, wives and children of the drunkards. Her addresses were eloquently delivered and made a favorable impression on her hearers. She speaks again tonight at 8 o'clock in the same place.

ONLY SOME SMALL ENGAGEMENTS

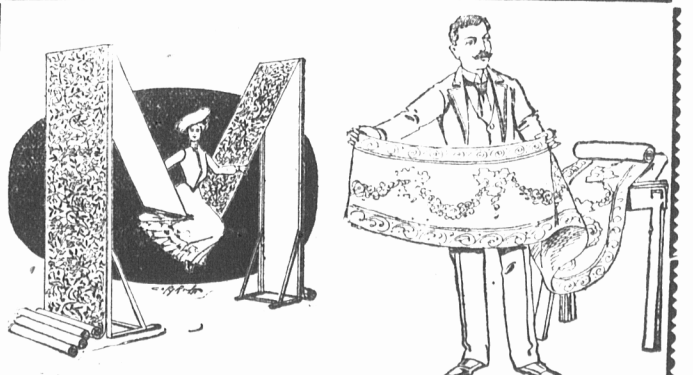
Fighting Between Japs and Cossacks in Korea and Liao Tung Peninsula—The Cossacks Defeated—No News from Port Arthur—Doings in and About Dalny.

SOME MINOR ENGAGEMENTS. LONDON, June 4—(Special)—Official reports have been received of several engagements during the week between the Japanese and Cossacks north of Pulan Tien, (also called Polapdien and Port Adams) on the Liao Tung peninsula in which the Cossacks were steadily driven back with some losses. NO NEWS FROM PORT ARTHUR. The general situation in the war zone is not altered and no news has been received from Port Arthur. BOLD BRIGANDS NEAR NEW CHWANG. Brigands in the vicinity of New Chwang are becoming bolder and foreign protection may be asked. LATEST FROM DALNY. Advice from Dalny say the Japanese have restored order in Dalny and taken Talien Wan and driven out the bandits. Dalny was not badly damaged by the Russian explosions. COSSACKS SUFFER IN KOREA. In an engagement on Friday between the Japanese and Cossacks near Gensen Korea, a number of Cossacks were killed.
