

Labor Day Race Meet At Riverside Provides Good Racing

A record crowd was in attendance at the Harness Racing meet held yesterday afternoon at Riverside track. Close finishes were the order of the day, and in many instances photo-finishes were necessary to decide the various winners.

Just Flicka was the only straight heat winner of the afternoon as she came through in the Number Three Classified to head a field of four other pacers. Sugar Harvest was the contending horse in the first mile but in the next two heats Abegweit Miledy came on to furnish the opposition for the smooth-pacing leader.

Owner Harold Cudmore drove his second winner of the afternoon when he took Prince Budlong home in front of a field of four in the Number One Classified event. Prince was just too good in the first two heats as he headed Billy MacVeigh and Ola Budlong; but in the final mile of the race he had to yield to the closing rush of Billy and Ola.

In the Number Two Classified, Eva Worthing came through as expected to win the first dash but a disastrous break early in the second mile saw Chevrolet Chandler's Lusticia, driven by Austin Tierney, head the field to the wire with Bonnie's Boy coming through in

The Number One Classified went to a Port Ellen owned horse, Peter Brook Second, which J. M. Tremblay had entered. Loch Hunter, of the Goodwill Stables, Sussex, finished fourth and first, behind the first and third registered by Peter Brook Second in the two-dash race.

The fourth event of the card, the 2:27-2:29, was run in two divisions, with the top horses in the first two heats ending in the third and final heat. Tim O'Shancko, owned by Steadman and Tracy of Sackville, N. B., finished first in the first heat and second in the third heat to cop top honors. Mr. Cherrle, owned by Mrs. Milton, Coverdale, took second spot placing second in the final heat and in the second heat. Coronet Klumuck, a Springfield horse, finished first in the second division then third in the final run to cop third place.

Billy Bishop and Aboloma tangled wheels in the first heat of the 2:27-2:29 and were not able to complete the run. No one was injured in the accident.

Abegweit Team Winners Of Track And Field Meet

Coming through with a terrific showing in both departments, the Charlottetown Abegweit track and field senior squad piled up a total of 63 points to win the second annual Maritime invitation track and field meet held at the Memorial Field yesterday afternoon under the sponsorship of the Department of Physical Fitness, over crack teams from all the leading amateur athletic clubs throughout the Maritimes.

The Navy team from the H.M.C.S. Stadacona placed second with 22 points, while Halifax Wanderers, Fredericton and Moncton placed in a three-way tie for third place, with 14 points each.

The Wanderers copied off the trophy for the junior team aggregate with 24 points, Moncton taking second with 11 points, Navy third with nine and Abbies fifth with five points.

Turning in impressive performances in both the track and field divisions, the Abbies were in a class by themselves as far as team aggregate scoring was concerned, with their nearest competitors, the Halifax Navy team, placing a distant second with a total of 22 points.

The individual competition was of the keenest calibre throughout the meet, however, with many of the standing records in both track and field events at Memorial Field falling by the wayside to make way for new records.

Many of the visiting Mainland athletes coping off many of the individual trophies and prizes, including the Junior aggregate team trophy which was won by Wanderers of Halifax.

Among the many other activities over the week-end, the Curran and Briggs nine set the Charlottetown Abbies back on their heels at Memorial Field on Sunday when they lashed back in the fourth game of the Island Physical Fitness Baseball League playoff finals to take a 4-1 victory from the locals to tie up the series at two games apiece.

The team which was won by Wanderers of Halifax.

The Junior City Baseball League also saw an upset victory in the semi-finals at Memorial Field when the Harry McInnis coached Victorias handed out an 11-6 shellacking to the Knights of Columbus.

The game was the first in the playoff finals and bring the Knights three-game winning streak to an end.
