Large Requests To  
Church of England

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire)  
SAINT JOHN, N. B., Nov. 28 —  
Through the will of the last mem-  
ber of the famous Odell family the  
Fredericton Diocese of the  
Church of England will receive the  
largest bequest in its history—more  
than \$85,000.

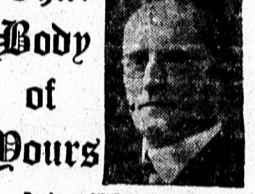
It was learned tonight that in  
addition to straight bequests of  
\$20,000 to Christ Church Cathedral  
and \$5,000 to St. Anne's Church,  
Fredericton, which were announced  
when the will of Miss M. Kearney  
Odell was probated at Halifax last  
Monday, the residue of the \$450,000  
estate will be equally divided be-  
tween the Anglican diocese of Nova  
Scotia and the diocese of Frederic-  
ton.

This residue will bring each of  
them at least \$60,000. Under terms  
of the will, the money may be used  
for any purpose decided on by the  
Diocesan Synods.

May Change Name Of  
Northern Ireland

BELFAST, Nov. 28 —(AP)—A  
hint that Viscount Craigavon's  
Government proposes to take  
action to have the name of the six  
counties changed from northern  
Ireland to Ulster has been given  
by Attorney-General Sir Anthony  
Babington.  
The step was desirable, he said,  
because of the "impudent attempt"  
of the Free State to declare in its  
new constitution that its territory  
was "the whole of Ireland, its  
Islands and territorial seas."

BE FAIR TO OTHERS AND TO  
YOURSELF WHEN YOU HAVE  
A COLD

I have spoken before of the  
kindhearted, considerate, con-  
scientious woman who was so anx-  
ious not to disappoint her friends  
in a bridge game at the home of  
one of the three, that despite a  
most severe cold with a high  
temperature, increased pulse,  
coughing and expectorating, she  
bravely got out of bed and kept  
the appointment.

The result was that all three of  
the other women promptly con-  
tracted the cold, one at least with  
serious symptoms.

The point, of course, is that even  
if you have a slight cold—have  
either the beginning or the end of  
a cold—you should not in fairness,  
go where there will be others close  
to you, in homes, public con-  
veniences, theatres, church or else-  
where.

Federal Health  
Committee Named

OTTAWA, Nov. 26—(CP)—The  
National Health Department to-  
night announced its minister, Hon.  
C. G. Power, had approved creation  
of a scientific advisory committee  
on reduction of maternal mortality.  
The step followed establishment by  
the department of a division of  
child and maternal hygiene.

Members of the committee are  
Professor William A. Scott, Uni-  
versity of Toronto, Professor John  
D. McQueen, University of Man-  
itoba.  
Professor Stephen Langevin, Uni-  
versity of Montreal, and Dr. E.  
Couture, Ottawa, newly-appointed  
chief of the division of child and  
maternal hygiene, who will act as  
secretary.

The department's announcement  
said the committee's object would  
be to study causative factors of  
maternal mortality and recommend  
adoption generally of such reme-  
dial measures as may be considered  
of value in reduction of maternal  
mortality.

APPLE FRITTERS
