BRITISH WARSHIPS BOMBARD TURKS

(Special to The Guardian.) ATHENS, April 22.—Four British warships in the Gulf of Saros, bombarded the Turkish town of Bulairin, Tuesday, and also shelled Ottoman positions on Gallipoli Peninsula, east and west of Bulair. On the same day a British torpedo boat flotilla proceeded along the coast near Smyrna and shelled Turkish camps at Lytri and Katopangia.

BETTING ON PROBABLE END OF WAR

(Special to The Guardian.) NEW YORK, April 22.—Odds of \$1,000 to \$300 were offered on New York streets to-day that the war will end before December 30, 1915; \$1,000 to \$500 that it will end before November 30; and even money that it will end before October 30.

ENGLISH TRAWLER SHELLED AND SUNK

ITALIAN ULTIMATUM TO AUSTRIA?

(Special to The Guardian.) ROME, April 22.—A report has been received from Petrograd to-day to the effect that Italy has sent a note to Austria which virtually amounts to an ultimatum. The note is said to embody the minimum of terms upon which Italy will consent to conclude an agreement with Austria. It is impossible to confirm this report here. The general opinion in Rome, is that an agreement may still be reached. Nevertheless, military preparations are being continued with the greatest energy along the frontier where Austria is concentrating troops.

GREEK SHIP BLOWN UP ELEVEN PERSONS KILLED

(Special to The Guardian.) PARIS, April 22.—Eleven persons were killed when a Greek ship bound from Piraeus to Samos struck a Turkish mine in the Aegean Sea and was blown up. The captain, his wife, and nine sailors perished, according to a despatch from Athens, which states that the mine drifted from the Dardanelles.

INTERVIEWED GERMAN SHIPS NOT CONFISCATED

(Special to The Guardian.) LONDON, April 22.—Britain has not yet decided to act on the suggestion to confiscate interned German and Austrian ships in retaliation for every British merchant ship sunk by German submarines. Premier Asquith answering a question in the Commons this afternoon put by Lord Cass, Beresford, added to the foregoing that this decision did not preclude reconsideration of the matter should things demand it.

BRITAIN CLOSES TRADE WITH HOLLAND

(Special to The Guardian.) LONDON, April 22.—The following official statement was issued here to-day on behalf of the British Government: "All shipping between Holland and the United Kingdom is stopped for the time being. No ships will leave the United Kingdom for Holland and will not be admitted to the United Kingdom after to-day. It is hoped shortly to resume a limited cargo and passenger traffic. Special arrangements have been made for the transfer of mails."

EXPECTED ACTIVITY IN NORTH SEA

(Special to The Guardian.) COPENHAGEN, via London, April 22.—The presence of an Anglo-French squadron in the waters to the north of Stavanger, Norway, is reported by vessels coming into Copenhagen. A Norwegian coast steamer from these waters says she was stopped and inspected by a British warship. Reports continue to be received here of the presence of German warships in the North Sea.
