PUSH IN HOLLAND (Continued from page 1.) A front dispatch said the people of Holland surpassed the French in their hilarious welcome to liberating troops. The Nazi prisoners were crowded as mostly poor specimens. Possibly 1,500 Allied planes in all, including about 75 bombers, smashed the enemy rail centres of Hamm and Soest, some 80 miles to the east, with an estimated 2,500 tons of bombs in a move to keep German heavy artillery from coming within range of the Arnhem-Nijmegen pocket.

First Fall Rains The brilliant Allied operation to turn the enemy's northern flank took on increased importance as fall rains turned the front from Cologne to Belfort gap into a quagmire, enabling the Nazis to fight the American 1st, 3rd and 7th armies to a virtual standstill. Along the Moselle River and into the Saar Valley it poured rain, and tanks slipped through deepening mud. Meanwhile Canadian forces continued their task of wiping out German resistance in the Bologno, finding the enemy strongly entrenched in the southwestern section of the valuable channel port. William Stewart, Canadian Press War Correspondent, said in a field dispatch Canadian shock troops fighting in the town and in its perimeter defences have taken 2,000 prisoners. A German broadcast acknowledged Canadian forces had fought their way into Boulogne but asserted they had been repelled. LONDON, Sept. 19 - (CP) - A load of 12,000 pound bombs was loaded on the German 4,000-ton battleship Tirpitz in her Norwegian hideaway, the Air Ministry reported today. The attack was made last Friday by big Lancasters of the R. A. F. Bomber Command. Although unescorted, the bombers suffered no losses. Visibility was excellent but an intense smoke screen made it difficult to assess results, a communication source said. The ship lying in the Norwegian fjord of Kaa. Stockholm reports said the great ship was heavily damaged and that at least 39 of the crew were killed and more than 100 injured.

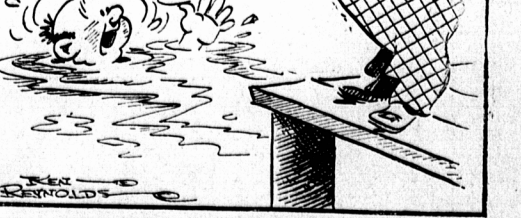
