THE CENTRAL GUARDIAN Jasper Park Had Outstanding Season

JASPER, Alta., Oct. 31 - "Jasper National Park had its greatest season in 1940 and established many records. We are naturally greatly encouraged by this tremendous increase in patronage and look forward to 1941 as a year that will establish even higher attendance figures," declared Major J. A. Wood, superintendent of Jasper National Park today, in discussing the season just closing. "We feel that we are just coming into our own this year Jasper is the largest national park on the continent and its 4200 square miles offer something of interest to every visitor." The increase in both visitors and motor cars was tremendous and no doubt can be laid to a large extent to the newly opened Columbia Icefield highway connecting Jasper National Park with Banff, in 1939 Jasper National Park recorded 3,100 motor cars and approximately 21,000 persons. Another feature was the figures grew enormously with more than 19,000 motor cars and 83,000 people. "Miette hot springs proved a big attraction and more than 15,000 persons took advantage of the beneficial waters during the season. There is a splendid bathhouse and pool at Miette with fine camp accommodation close by. Registrations at the various camp grounds were four times the number in 1939 and the same figures apply to the registrations at the local information bureau." Of course the outstanding feature of our 1940 season was the opening of the Columbia Icefield highway, declared Major Wood. This road is second to none in the world as far as scenic splendor is concerned, the opening of this road has attracted tourists from all over the continent. Another feature was the amount of trail work done during the season. The new trail from Maligne Lake over Shovel Pass along the skyline back to Signal Mountain has been completed and is an outstanding character. "The Astoria Valley, one of the beauty spots of the park, has also had attention and a new trail has been established up the valley which will cut down the time between Jasper and the Tonquin Valley by two hours. "We had good fishing this year, not only in the Maligne Maligne area, but also in the Tonquin and Astoria Valleys, the rainbows are becoming quite as popular with visiting anglers as the speckled trout. "We are looking forward to a large number of visitors this winter as last year the skiing attracted considerable attention. Many noted skiers were here this summer to look over the situation and will be back this winter. There is no finer skiing anywhere than in Jasper National Park," declared superintendent Wood.
