WHITE MOURNING

OTTAWA, May 12.—A suggestion which has received the approval of Major General Hughes and headquarters staff, comes from Westmount, Montreal, to the effect that white should be worn instead of black by relatives of those killed in the war. It is argued that there is enough depression in war without adding to it by wearing sombre colors. It is also suggested that a white badge worn on the arm would serve as a mark of distinction and would be more of an honor of those who have fallen in the service of their country than by the wearing of black.

UNEXPECTED DEATH.—The sad intelligence was received in the city last evening by telegram to Mrs. Levi Langille, of the death in Waltham, Mass., of her brother, Mr. Bamford Wood, of Alexandria, Lot 49. Mr. Wood left on May 4th to have an operation performed which his friends did not consider serious. It turned out otherwise, however, as he was operated on Monday and died on Thursday. The deceased was a young man of sterling character and his early death will be a great blow to the community in which he lived. He is survived by a widow, daughter of David Jones, of Pownal, and three children, Emory in Edmonton, Alta.; Brecken, in Winnipeg, Man.; and one daughter, Oledine, at home. Four sisters, Mrs. W. O. Pratt, of Wheaton, Ill.; Mrs. Levi Langille, of Charlottetown; Mrs. S. M. Cole, of Fairmount, Nebraska; and two brothers, Pope, of New Bedford, Mass.; Wm. E. Lowell survive him. Deceased was about 50 years old. The body will leave Waltham Friday night and it is expected to arrive in the City on Saturday night.

SUCCESSFUL ISLANDER.—Among the names of successful islanders abroad there has appeared recently that of Mr. Donald McDonald, of Vancouver, B. C., formerly of Shamrock, Lot 67, P. E. I., who has just been admitted to the Bar of British Columbia. Mr. McDonald is the eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Duncan McDonald of Rose Valley, P. E. I. He was educated at the Shamrock Public School and the Emerald High School of his native province. In July, 1906, he matriculated to Prince of Wales College, entering that institution in the autumn of the same year. In May, 1907, he received a Teacher's License of the second class.
