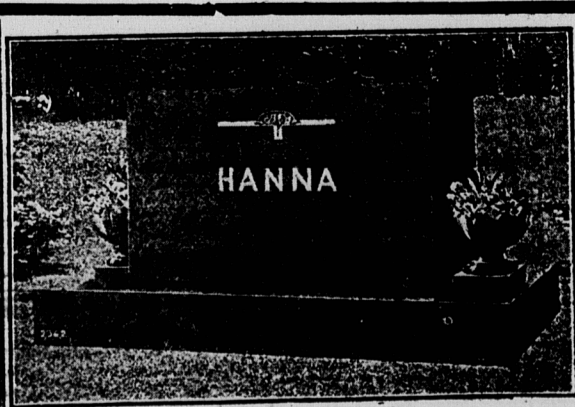

and sea, and will challenge the wild and plans of these armies, whose camp will be, by ordinary dog-sled route, about three to five weeks' journey from their main base. Yet they hope to manage things much differently by means of airplanes voyaging, and if all goes well, the containers dropped from the planes should ensure them the useful supplies of food. For long it has been a sort of maxim amongst meteorologists that the weather conditions prevalent in Greenland have much to do with the vagaries of our wintry climate, and largely determine the weather moods which reach other lands in the shape of cyclonic storms. The Greenland Ice Cap is supposed to be the "weather-breeder" and to exercise an influence on

respondent to the milder influence of the Gulf Stream upon the sea, although the Greenland ice-tang is at the opposite end of the thermal scale, and is frigidly severe. But, as stated in the report concerning this expedition, the data in respect of Greenland itself and its weather conditions are scanty and hypothetical, and these airplane explorers cherish the hope of being able to increase our knowledge and so clear up many weather questions which have hitherto remained puzzling and vague. To this purpose they intend to spend the whole coming winter upon the "Cap." Should this plan be fully carried out, it will serve a double end. It should throw light upon the possibility of establishing aerial landing stations in the trip to and from Europe and America. And it may bring within reach much more accurate knowledge concerning the cycles of weather pressures which exercise so wide an influence far beyond the ice cap, the supposed stormy cradle of our wintry blasts. In spite of all our accumulated knowledge about natural forces and phenomena in other directions, our knowledge of the weather still resembles the inconstant weathercock itself. All onlookers will cordially wish these intrepid explorers the best of luck and a successful issue of their enterprise.
