Evidence Taken Yesterday In Rum Robbery Case

(Continued from Page 1)

"Your business here is importing to St. John?"

"Does the St. John office report to Sackatchewan?"

"What staff have you here?"

"We have Ernest Hogan, night watchman; Armand Bazinet, Montreal manager, and Jos. Doyle clerk."

"Mr. Bazinet hired by the St. John company?"

"Have you a book-keeper?"

"No."

"Had you more than that of a staff before?"

"Yes, at the beginning of the year we had two stenographers and engaged occasional help."

"Had you two stenographers last August?"

"I was not here last August."

"Who started the business then?"

"Mr. Ochen, from Montreal."

"Was Mr. Bazinet here then?"

"No. We came over at the same time. Bazinet succeeded him as Island manager."

"What position did you hold then?"

"I was in the St. John office."

"Bazinet remained as manager how long?"

"I was manager practically all the time, and during that time I visited the branches each month. I was here part of the time and in St. John part of the time."

"Are you boss of the St. John office?"

"No. Mr. Brompton is head man there."

"Is a pretty big concern, isn't it? They are millionaires, are they not?"

"Well, they might be. They are a pretty big concern."

"Do you know anything about the small details of the office?"

"No."

"Ten puncheons of rum is only a small shipment for your concern, isn't it?"

"No, it's a pretty large shipment of rum."

"That was ordered through you?"

"Yes."

"Did you make the bargain in St. John, or New York?"

"I always make the trade in St. John. I wired from there through Chas. Owen to New York and they cabled to Georgetown, Demerara."

"Is Mr. Owen in the liquor business?"

"He is agent for all the liquor people."

"Do you know if he is agent for Ross & Bros?"

"Yes. You got him to wire for you to their office in New York and he asked them to cable South for Demerara rum for you?"

"Yes."

"Do you know the parties direct—the shippers at Demerara?"

"No."

"Can you explain why, when you had this rum sent to you it came to W. A. Ross & Bros., Charlottetown?"

"Yes. All liquor shipped through order of the shippers—all documents attached to a signed draft, have to be paid before you can get hold of the goods in this case, by being cabled for, evidently Ross Bros. sent it to our order at Charlottetown."

"Does all liquor that you get come in that way?"

Will Vote Against Embargo Removal

LONDON, July 5.—Sir Arthur Griffith-Boscawen, President of the Board of Agriculture, in an article in Lloyd's Sunday News dealing with the Canadian cattle embargo, says that in the coming debate on the subject in the House of Commons he will both speak and vote against any change in the existing law. He declares that agricultural opinion is overwhelmingly opposed to the removal of the embargo.

According to the article, agriculturalists know it would be detrimental to the British stock-breeding industry and would drive a number of small farmers out of business. Regarding statements made to the effect that the embargo kept up the price of beef because it facilitates the operation of meat trusts, Sir Arthur says the most effective safeguard against such trusts is increased home production. The importation of stores would have the opposite effect.

The article concludes by saying that if, as a result of the removal of the embargo, home-breeding of beef is discouraged, the supply of fresh milk would diminish.

When you did that did you have the former stock list to check it up against?"

"Have you any entries in your warehouse or place of business other than this bill of lading to show about those ten puncheons of rum?"

"No."

"You took two out of bond. If the manager came over from St. John and went to look over those ten puncheons, how would he find out from your office where the two were taken in from bond?"

"We would just show him the puncheons. We have no record at all."

"The Court adjourned until 10.30 this morning."
