LONDON, Nov. 17.—The Daily Mail says that the Admiralty has lately tested a new type of armor-piercing shell. Instead of a sharp point, the apex of the projectile has a cupped hollow. A six-inch projectile of this pattern went through armor of the same thickness as the "Dreadnought's" waterline armor. The test seems to indicate the necessity for thickening armor.
