WHY THE GOVERNMENT SHOULD LOWER THE TARIFF.

The reasons are many why the Laurier Administration should reduce the present high protective tariff. The Liberal party is bound to this course by its platform and pledges made when in opposition. The old Conservative tariff, but a trifle lower than the tariff now in force, was denounced in unmeasured terms by the Liberal convention of 1893. It was charged that it had developed monopolies, trusts and combinations; that it had decreased the value of farm and landed property; that it had oppressed the masses to the enrichment of the few; that it had caused great loss of population and had impeded commerce. We are of those who still think that indictment was just, and that the Liberal claim in 1893 that "the tariff should be reduced to the needs of honest, economical and efficient government" was a sound one.

Wherefore it is the duty of the Government to act without unreasonable delay in making a further reduction. But there are other strong reasons for this course besides those above named. The tariff is now yielding twice as much customs revenue as it was in 1893. That of itself is another strong reason. Under our greatly expanded trade the customs taxation, while a fraction lower in percentage than it then was, is far higher per head of population than it was in 1893 or 1896. Under these circumstances the delay of fourteen years during which the party now in power has maintained the policy of high protection, makes the present call for reduction a particularly reasonable and urgent one. Nor does this exhaust the number of reasons for tariff reduction at the present time.

There is yet this further reason. When the National Policy was introduced by Sir John Macdonald in 1897 it was for the declared purpose of

THE AMENDED DECLARATION.

The King's accession declaration bill in amended form has passed its second reading by the large majority of 325 in a House of 494. This shows very clearly that despite the petitions, protests and agitations of which so much has been heard of late, the representatives of the people have calmly resolved upon the change. The declaration, which was made by the late King Edward at his coronation, was well known to have been repugnant to him, in so far as the words declaring certain doctrines and practices of the Roman Catholic Church to be superstitious and idolatrous, were concerned. There is good reason to believe also that our present King is strongly desirous that the objectionable words shall be removed before he shall be called upon to subscribe to them at his coronation in June next. So that the action of the House of Commons now taken shows that the feelings and wishes of the Sovereign and the people alike are supporting the change.

To show that the offensive words, in the declaration, now to be eliminated, were quite unnecessary as an assurance that the King is a Protestant, it is only necessary to cite a single passage from the coronation oath which passage remains and will remain unchanged. The Archbishop of Canterbury at the coronation will still demand of the King as follows: Archbishop. Will you, to the utmost of your power, maintain the

laws of God, the true profession of the Gospel, and the Protestant reformed religion, established by law? And will you maintain and preserve inviolably the settlement of the United Church of England and Ireland, and the doctrine, worship, discipline and government thereof, as by law established in England and Ireland, and the territories thereunto belonging?

The King. All this I promise to do. The Sovereign then goes to the altar, and laying his hand upon the Gospels, takes the following oath: "The things which I have heretofore promised I will perform and keep, so help me God." The Sovereign then kisses the book and signs the oath. Surely this ought to be enough to satisfy even an ultra Protestant. By the amended declaration as proposed in the bill when first introduced, the King was required to declare that he is a member of the Church of England. The Nonconformists did not like this and the change was made to the simple words, "I am a faithful Protestant," at their instance. This form of words can hardly be acceptable to those Anglican churchmen who affirm that the Church of England is not, and cannot properly be called Protestant. But the words are clear and unmistakable and appear to express all that is necessary with regard to the religious faith of the King.

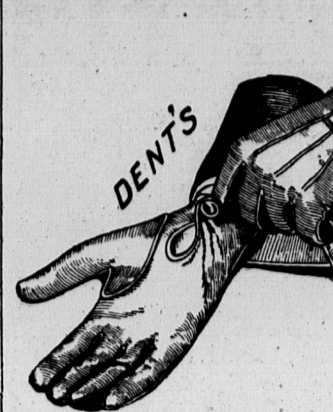

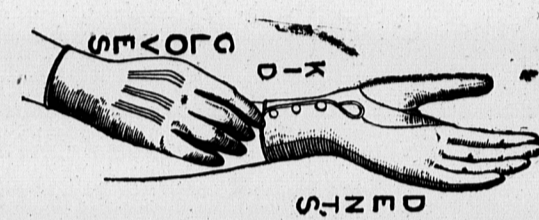
