Hundreds of homeless settlers in the Cedros and Teacoe districts were suffering from shortage of food, and many in other areas were in the same plight. Surgeon General K. S. Wise left Port of Spain Friday, travelling overland to the stricken southern country. Yesterday Sir A. Claud Hollis, Governor of Trinidad and Tobago, flew over the devastated country, and a relief fund has been opened here.

W.M.S. Of Trinity Hears Address

The Women's Missionary Society of Trinity United Church met by invitation on the grounds of Mrs. LeBaron Tait on Friday, June 30th, at three o'clock. The weather was ideal, a perfect June day. About eighty-five members of the Auxiliary and their friends, sat on the lawn and after a short devotional and business period conducted by the President Mrs. J. L. Lockhart, and Mrs. W. A. Thompson, the guest speaker for the occasion, Sadhu J. Nelson Christiana was introduced by Rev. O. N. Brown.

It seemed very fitting that the Sadhu should address a group of women who were interested in missions because he is a high-caste Brahmin, whose grandfather was the first Brahmin to be converted. He then brought all the people in his village to Christ. What an eloquent answer to the question—Are Foreign Missions worth while?

The Sadhu is an eloquent and forceful speaker, and his stories of the courage and self sacrifice of the poorer brethren in his country were most interesting and the manner in which they gave of their very scanty earnings to help to start new churches in neighbouring villages was a suggestion that might lead one to think that the people of the West were not quite as self-sacrificing as they had thought they were. It would seem that the Sadhu, in his first visit to America a few years ago, felt slightly disappointed to learn that out of every dollar, Americans spend ninety cents in worldly things and three quarters of a cent on missions. He thought that a clearer vision of the Living Christ would give to Western people a vision of the need of millions of people who have never yet heard of Him, and who know nothing of the Christian's God. The Sadhu expressed his admiration for the work done in Trinidad by the Canadian people, among the East Indian people who come there in such numbers.

The address was listened to with close attention and interest, and at the close many of the women talked, with the visitor, and found him most interesting. Rev. Mr. Brown, Mrs. Lockhart and Mrs. A. McNair voiced the thanks of the meeting.

A social hour was spent and afternoon tea served by the Brighton members of the Auxiliary and some of their friends.
