THE CATTLE EMBARGO.

The outbreak of the foot-and-mouth disease among the cattle of Massachusetts and other New England States has caused our Government to adopt stringent measures to prevent the introduction of the malady into the Dominion. The disease is a contagion which affects cattle and other animals, manifesting itself by lameness, indisposition to eat, and general febrile conditions, with eruptions of small vesicles on the feet, in the mouth and elsewhere. It may also be communicated to persons who drink the unboiled milk of cows affected with the disease. Whenever an outbreak of this contagion is noted, importation of cattle from or through the infected district is at once prohibited by importing countries. As Great Britain is the market for most of the cattle exported from Canada and the United States it will be seen how serious a matter is the present "scheduling" of New England ports as ports from

which the British Country will no longer receive at importations.

Canada and the great transportation companies are seriously affected. The Grand Trunk Railway has its Atlantic port at Pictou, Nova Scotia, but even Canada is wholly free from disease, cannot be shipped to England by that route, because the district through which the railway passes is infected and because of the possibility of infected cattle being mixed with the shipments of Canadian cattle. The Canadian Pacific Railway has also done a large transportation of cattle, to St. John for shipment there. The embargo has, for the present at least, cut off this business as well, because the C. P. passes through the state of Maine. This portion of the inter-district might reasonably be removed as the railway passes through a portion of the country which is mainly unsettled. The British authorities are yet to be heard from in that regard, and they unfortunately, may be influenced by British cattle raisers, whose object is to restrict the importations as much as possible in order to advance the price at which they can sell to their British customers.

As the close of navigation by the St. Lawrence is now near at hand, it will be seen that with the Grand Trunk and Canadian Pacific Railways closed to cattle transport the only route remaining for transporting cattle to our Atlantic ports is that of the Intercolonial. No doubt its business will be greatly increased in that line for the time, with a proportionate increase of cattle shipments to the old world from St. John and Halifax. The Grand Trunk, and possibly the C.P.R. as well, will hand over their cattle traffic to the Government road. It is an ill wind that blows good to nobody, but the temporary advantage to our national railway and Atlantic ports will but partially make good the loss from the interruption and diversion of an important line of the export trade. We trust and hope that the contagion among the New England herds may be speedily controlled and eradicated but it will probably be some months in the future before they can obtain "a clean bill of health."
