Continued from page one contract between the Town and the Lighting Company. It would be useless to talk of installing a competing plant for domestic lighting only, like street pavements, water, telephones, etc., this should be monopolized by one Company, either privately or publicly owned.

EFFECT OF NEW EQUIPMENT

I may say frankly, that when the new equipment already purchased, together with that contemplated in the estimates is installed, that the Plant will be equal to any of its size in Canada and more efficient than most such Plants, because of the great gas engines.

With the changing over to sixty (60) cycles, a day load could be obtained anytime. This would give the Electric Line the present revenue derived from the gas plant. The City could then operate its crusher, sewerage pump, plants, etc., by electricity and if the Town water pumps were driven by electricity a day load would be obtained immediately.

As shown, the business value of the Plant is the only important value. If the Charlottetown Light and Power Company's Plant is purchased, the City obtains at once an established load, giving immediate revenues and the City obtains at once a properly developed and efficient business organization, none of which come with a new plant.

With the City auditors, I have gone over the books and made proper allowances for depreciation sinking fund assets and liabilities and would say without hesitation, that the City can well afford to pay the Charlottetown Light and Power Company an amount based on one hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$125.00) for each one hundred dollars (\$100.00) share of common stock as shown.

This whole report and these recommendations are made on the assumption that the property would be operated by an independent commission, who would continue the present efficient management, as without this, nothing can be forecasted. A careful management is absolutely essential.

I am sure that if this management is given and the Plant completed as now laid out, that the best days of the Light and Power Property lie before it.
