THE EDITOR'S MAIL.

To the Editor of the Guardian.

Sir.—We have been anxiously looking for the Secretary's Report of the prohibition rally which came off here in Dundas some short time since; beginning with a meeting of the King's Co. branch of the Temperance Alliance held in the school house at Bridgetown, where some very important prohibition business was transacted.

According to previous arrangements the Secretary's notice calling the meeting, contained an invitation to the clergymen of the county to attend.

Three only responded, viz.—Rev. W. Phelan of St. George's P. P. and the Revs. Mr. Motley and Davidson of Montague. All of whom rendered most indispensable assistance in the very important work done. At the close of the session the meeting was adjourned to the Baptist Meeting House where a public meeting was convened at seven p.m. Martin McKinnon in the chair. The house was crowded.

The Revd. Mr. Phelan whose name was the first on the program, (and I assure you Mr. Editor he has well earned that distinction) was the first called on to speak and he gave us a most magnificent address. It was "Multum in Parvo" (so much, so full,) giving all classes, and all ages the benefit of his fatherly advice, and timely warning. The Revd. Mr. Motley was then introduced by the chairman, and from the beginning to the close of his address, the audience was completely spell-bound by the power of his oratory. Never in the history of this place has the people listened to a more terrible indictment of the man-destroying, God-robbing traffic and those engaged in it, presented in words of intense earnestness and in masterly eloquence.

The Rev. Mr. Davidson was the next and I may say the last speaker, who we feared had been left in a condition of "thought-exhaustion" by the masterly addresses which preceded him. But it was not so, for after modestly saying that much of what he had intended to say had been fully and ably handled by those who had already spoken, he launched out into the discussion of other ideas and thoughts and gave us a grand, a magnificent address.

After a few remarks from others the meeting adjourned. (Sine die) to meet next at Montague Bridge.

The Rev. Mr. Nolan, pastor of the church although present did not speak, being at that time engaged in preparing a temperance sermon which he delivered or preached the following Sunday. It was the finest discourse of the kind I ever heard. Beginning with the first instance where we find any allusion to strong drink or drunkenness in the sacred volume, he went right down through the good Book submitting each passage where strong drink or drunkenness is named, to a most critical examination, knocking into fragments the whole superstructure of supposed Bible authority raised by the tipping clericals who love their wine more than the souls of men and thoroughly convinced his audience that there is no authority in God's word for the horrible thing.

The writer regrets that the few remarks made by him relative to the question of responsibility for the terrible condition of things so vividly portrayed by the speakers of the evening should have been understood personally. The intention was to show that the pulpits, the press and the schools, or the defective educative system all the world over were responsible for the senseless, wicked, godless liquor-selling and liquor drinking usage of that which is called civilized society.

PRESIDENT KRUGER IS FAILING

General Viljoen Formerly of the Boer Army Hears that the Aged Boer Exile's Health is Breaking Down.

St. Louis, Feb. 29.—A letter received in this city by General Benjamin Viljoen, formerly of the Boer army, announces that former President Paul Kruger, of the Boer republic, is slowly dying as an exile at Meton, France, and that Dr. Reitz, state secretary under President Kruger, is an exile in Holland and a constant sufferer from nervous prostration.

Speaking of Mr. Kruger, General Viljoen said today: "Mr. information regarding the late president of the republic comes from a member of the household. The poor old man's mind is falling rapidly and his health is very poor, and it is apparent to

those close to him that the end is approaching. He lives in almost entire seclusion and rarely converses with any one. When he does engage in conversation his tone is sad and pathetic and the sentences are disconnected.

"The former president is eighty-two years old. At the commencement of the late war he was in perfect health and sound of intellect. Our defeat seems to have shattered his ambition, and the loss of his wife and youngest son has left an unhealable wound in his heart. Dr. Reitz too is in most indifferent health. He is suffering from nervous prostration and is a constant invalid."

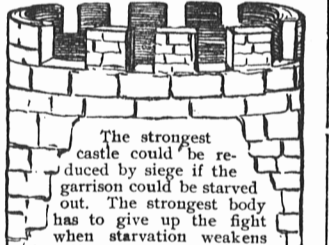
