ROY S. MACDONALD

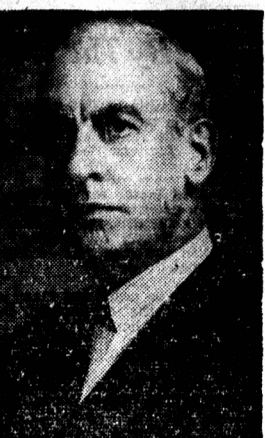

N. E. S. Activities In Placing Veterans

A busy centre these days is the National Employment Service office where all returning servicemen register for employment. In addition a complete record of unemployed veterans with their qualifications is on file. The records thus kept provide a ready reference and when jobs become available the local department can provide any employer with a suitable applicant. It is also the duty of the local office to see that a returned man who held a position some three months prior to enlistment is given an opportunity to return to his old job with all the advantages that have accrued to it during his years of war service. "There has been little or no trouble in getting veterans re-instated," stated Mr. J. B. Murley. "There is, however, difficulty in getting youthful veterans placed who before the war were not on the employment market." In many of these cases it was pointed out by the men concerned are drawing "out of work benefits" which helps them over the lean period until jobs, seasonal or permanent, are available. These benefits are good for a period of 18 months. Another way in which the veteran is assisted is the "awaiting returns grant." It is a grant made to the veteran starting out in business, engaging in farming or fishing to tide him over the first few months or year until the venture has had an opportunity to prove profitable. Assisted by Mr. Murley in this important job of re-habilitation is Mr. Alan Murphy. There is the job of getting "the right man in the right place" and they interview prospective employers with a view to achieving this goal. Mr. J. T. The Bank of Nova Scotia 114th Annual Statement

All time year-end figures for deposits and total assets feature the 114th Annual Statement of The Bank of Nova Scotia which is released today. Assets of \$913,517,014 show an increase of \$71,000,000. Net Profits are \$1,929,827. This compares with \$1,445,426 for the previous ten months' period, the Bank having changed its year end from December 31st to October 31st last year. The usual strong liquid position is maintained. Other interesting items include increasing over two years, Investment Deposits and \$55,000,000 in Investment Account. Loans are up roundly \$13,000,000.

Liquid Position Continues Strong

Cash, clearings and balances due from other banks, \$119,488,507, represent 20.74 per cent of Total Liabilities to the public. Total Quick Assets, which include the above, together with Investments and Call and Short Loans secured by Dominion and Provincial securities, amount to \$453,054,992 and represent 78.85 per cent of liabilities to the public. The latter are composed of 78.85 per cent at date of last Statement.

Investments are up \$55,000,000

Investment Account now aggregates \$909,803,303, of which 85 per cent is in Dominion and Provincial securities; 47.5 per cent is in Dominion and Provincial securities, \$212,031,288 or 23.3 per cent in Municipal securities, \$28,210,005 in Public securities, \$12,144,310 in other bonds, debentures and stocks all at not exceeding market value. Loans are up Total Deposits are \$641,342,336, an increase of \$68,492,862. Interest-bearing deposits show an increase of over \$40,000,000 in the twelve months period, notwithstanding substantial withdrawals made during two Victoria Day campaigns. Deposits of Dominion and Provincial Governments at \$20,583,016 are practically unchanged. Demand Deposits of the public are up over \$21,000,000.

EIGHT YEARS OF AIRLINE PROGRESS Five stages in the rapid development of air transportation are reported photographically by Trans-Canada Air Lines, beginning with the 10-passenger Lockheed Electra (at top), with which T.C.A. pioneered airmail and passenger transportation in 1937. Next is the 14-passenger Lodestar which, in 1938 and 1939, was the world's fastest commercial transport plane. This is followed by the huge four-engine Lancaster transport plane which has been in the Canadian Government Trans-Atlantic Service, operated by Trans-Canada Air Lines since 1943. The military type was the famed Lancaster bomber which played such an important role in winning the war. Beneath the Lancaster is the twin engine 21-passenger Douglas DC-3 transport recently delivered. This is the first of a fleet of 20 to be placed in service at an early date. In the lower photograph is the 4-engine Douglas forty-passenger luxury liner, on which work has already started at the Canadian plant in Montreal. The new degree of air travel luxury offered to Canadian travellers by the DC-3 and the 5-mile-a-minute speed, plus increased efficiency and passenger comfort of the 4-engine craft are said to be the equivalent of any air service in the world.
