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THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press)

EGGS

OTTAWA, Ont., July 26—Eggs prices throughout Canada continue steady today and there is a continuation of a somewhat firmer feeling which has been evident the past two days. United States markets are firmer.

Toronto—Conditions of the egg market are about the same, dealers are quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs delivered cases returned, extras 34 to 35, firsts 31 to 32, seconds 24 to 26.

Montreal—The local egg market is firm and showing more activity under good demand. The present indications are that the market will work firmer, especially for the better grades of fresh.

Winnipeg—Prices and conditions on this market are unchanged. Dealers are quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs delivered cases returned, extras 32; firsts 29 to 30, seconds 25 to 26.

Saint John—The local egg market is quiet and unchanged with further dropping off in receipts. Quality is variable and there are some signs of held eggs appearing. Dealers are quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs delivered, cases returned, extras 35, firsts 30, seconds 24. Poultry shipments are heavy and well finished stock is in demand.

Montreal, Que., July 26—With the exception of a few sales of wheat and oats to the United Kingdom, the export trade in Canadian grain here today was quiet, the trade in cash grain in the domestic market was also slow, the only business of importance reported being sales of a few loads of No. 3 northern wheat at 21-2 cents per bushel over the Winnipeg, July option c.i.f. Montreal for nearby shipment. The local

and country demand for car lots was also quieter, but the tone of the market was steady and prices showed no further change. In sympathy with the reaction in cash wheat prices in the Winnipeg market a rather better feeling prevailed in the local spring wheat flour situation, but there was no unusual change in prices announced. There was some further business accomplished with foreign buyers over the night for August shipment, but the volume of business was not large, the movement for local and country account on old contracts was fair, the market for winter wheat flour was without and new phase to note, prices being still maintained with a very moderate amount of business passing. The trade in millfeed with the United States was quiet but the prices bid from Boston showed an advance of \$1 per ton for bran which, however were still out of line the local and country demand for supplies continues steady and a fair amount of business was done. Standard grades of rolled oats were reported dull. The demand for all grades of eggs continued good and a fairly active business was done at firm prices. The receipts were 2,448 cases. A small trade was done in choice white handpicked beans at \$4.10 per bushel.

Ex-store car lots were quoted at \$3.90 per bushel, the condition of the local butter situation was practically unchanged the undertone being firm with an increased inquiry from local interests for supplies. But the volume of business showed no improvement owing to the fact that holders views in most cases were stronger and were not disposed to accept present prices ruling for any quantity. The receipts were 1,641 packages. There was no improvement in the volume of business in cheese with English importers but the inquiry for supplies between houses on spot showed a create a better feeling in the market and holders in some instances were inclined to be firmer, in their views The receipts were 8,270 boxes.

PILOT KILLED

WASAGA BEACH, Ont., July 26.—Ralph Brown, aged 23, of Winnipeg, Man., was killed today when the plane he was piloting, crashed into a tree. It is believed that the plane struck an air pocket, causing the crash. Brown was stationed at the Royal Air Force Camp Borden and had received his pilot's certificate only a few days ago.

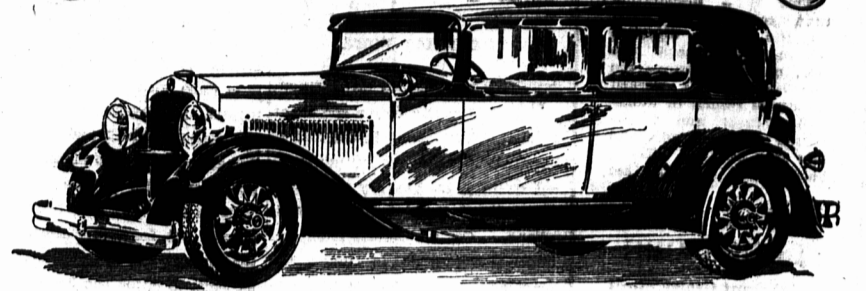
