Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

The sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta.

Duties—Six months residence on and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitation house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 20 acres and erect a house worth \$3.00. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, stony or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

PROHIBITION WOULD SOON SAVE COST OF OTTAWA BUILDINGS

AMHERST, Feb. 10.—"Wipe out the whiskey butts in Canada," said Rev. J. W. McConnell in the course of his sermon at Trinity Church last Sunday evening, "and there'll be enough money saved in a few weeks to put up parliament buildings worth \$15,000,000."

Mr. McConnell made his declaration as he spoke of the growing strength of the movement toward Dominion-wide prohibition and of the tremendous advantage that would follow the suppression of the liquor business. All Canada, he said, sorrowed at the destruction of the Parliament Buildings at Ottawa and the loss of life which was entailed. The buildings could not be replaced, in all probability, for less than \$10,000,000 or \$12,000,000. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, stony or stony land. Mr. McConnell also made passing reference to the enforcement of liquor laws, and pointed to Sydney as a city in which there is great laxity in enforcement.

SOLDIER JOINS SIGNALLERS

The following letter was received by Mrs. Frank S. McDonald, Norris Pond, Souris East, from her son Chester who has been in the firing line of France for some time.

Somewhere in France, Jan. 9, 1916 Dear Mother—

Just a few lines to remind you that I have dodged all German shells and bullets so far, and hope to be in the future.

I am now with the 3rd Divisional Co., and if I can learn to be a good operator I won't have to go back into the trenches again. I will be with some Brigade back of the firing line. Luck is following me so far or some one must be praying a lot for me.

We are now billeted in a small town and can sleep anywhere. My chum and I have hired a room and have a nice bed to sleep in. It is quite a change from sleeping in the straw.

I have not seen Alex. for a month. I am about eight miles from him now. I also have not had a chance to see Charlie yet.

I received your box a few days after Xmas. The cake was delicious. I received a box from the Souris Red Cross Society. Chas. Stegma sent me a nice sweater. It was very thoughtful of him, you might thank him for me. I would like to send him a souvenir. I have a nice one, got it in the trenches. It is a piece of a German Aeroplane—with bullet holes through it. We can not send anything like that home but I will take it home when this war is over. It cannot last more than a year longer in my opinion the Germans will have to give in some time.

There is not much fighting going on at present. The Germans tried to break through our lines once but failed, we mowed them down with artillery fire, poor beggars they will never break through on the western front.

The next time you write you might send me Marcella's address as I expect to go on a pass in a couple of months. I may see Alex. before then and get it from him but you send it anyway.

My new address is as follows, Signaller C. P. McDonald, 3rd Canadian Divisional Signalling Co., Can. Army Co., B. E. F., France. I must close for this time hoping to hear from you soon, love to all, from your loving son, CHESTER.

A BIGAMY CASE IN THE POLICE COURT.

ST. JOHN, Feb. 10.—Nicholas Richardson of Portage River was before the Police Court yesterday afternoon on the charge of bigamy. The defendant's son, Basil Richardson, who was brought to the city by Rev. Father Robichaud, was placed on the witness stand. He is a youth sixteen years of age, with little or no education and proved a very dull witness. He could not speak English well and Rev. Father Robichaud was sworn in as interpreter. The witness testified that his father caught the woman, Annie Veneo, home and lived with her, saying she was his wife.

Rev. Father Robichaud is in charge of the parish in which Richardson resided and also gave testimony. Richardson's first wife dead. Witness was away from home when Richardson married his second wife at the marriage ceremony was performed by another priest named Robichaud, who was taking the place of witness during his absence from the parish. Some time after Richardson is said to have married Annie Veneo in St. John while his second wife was still alive. Richardson called on witness and asked that his marriage to wife No. 2 be annulled. Witness said that this could not be done. The next time witness saw Richardson, the latter was living with Annie Veneo and said to witness "You had no business telling my son-in-law and my oldest son to put Annie out of the house because I am legally married to her." Witness asked Richardson where he had married Annie, and in reply Richardson said "I married her in St. John."
