He afterwards studied divinity at Newton Theological Institute and was ordained in 1876. He served as pastor at Milton and at Windsor, N. S., afterwards becoming professor of English literature and psychology in Acadia College. Prof. Kierstead received the degree of M. A. in 1883 and that of D. D. in 1895, from Acadia College. For years he was secretary, and in 1897 he was elected president of the Baptist convention of the maritime provinces.

A quiet wedding took place at the residence of Geo. H. Brown, Somerville, Mass., on Wednesday, May 24th, 1905, when Rev. Jas. MacDougall, pastor of Cape Traverse, DeSable, and Canoe Cove, P. E. D., according to the impressive ritual of the Church of Scotland, in the presence of a few immediate friends of the bride and groom. Mrs. Brown, the hostess, wore a gown of blue and white dotted muslin trimmed with valenciennes lace, with streamers of white satin ribbon. The parlor in which the ceremony was performed was handsomely decorated with cut flowers including lilacs, pinks, sweet peas, lilies and maiden-hair ferns, as well as a number of potted ferns. Rev. Mr. MacDougall is one of the most eloquent and earnest preachers in the Maritime Provinces and is well known in Boston and vicinity. The committee on property were authorized to arrange for the building of a new fence on School Street. Details for arrangements of pupils in Market Hall at closing were left with Board and Secretary. A number of applications for positions as teachers in the schools were read. Bills passed before the meeting adjourned.
