**A NAAROW ESCAPE.**

The November number of the Canadian Magazine gives a brief recital which is full of interest to all who take concern for the relations between Canada and the United Kingdom. The story in brief is this: In his budget speech last spring Hon. Mr. Fielding pointed out that if Great Britain did not remove the duty then levied on Colonial wheat and thus give it a preference "they cannot complain if we see fit to modify or change our preferential tariff." This was on April 16th and the words were hardly across the cables when the British Government announced that the duty on wheat was to be removed immediately and no preference was to be afforded Colonial foodstuffs. "looked serious. Mr. Fielding was haughty; the British Government was haughty. Mr. Fielding had put the chip on his shoulder; Sir Michael Hicks-Beach had knocked it off. Would the battle begin?"

Recently a despatch from London stated that a bill was actually drafted by the Canadian Government for the repeal of the preference and it would have been introduced in the Canadian Parliament had not Mr. Chamberlain made a speech which included a promise to consider the whole question of preferential tariffs. If this is true it was a pretty narrow escape. And in the meantime Sir Wilfrid Laurier has told how our hands were forced by the British Government in the matter of the Boundary Commission and hinted that Canada ought to have power to negotiate her own treaties. All of which goes to show that the relations between the Imperial and Ottawa Governments have been and continue to be somewhat strained. Does not this accentuate Mr. Chamberlain's contention that we are at the parting of the ways? That the relations between the Mother Country and the Colonies must be drawn closer if separation is to be avoided?

Obviously Canada's "free gift" of a tariff preference for British goods has had a narrow escape from being turned into an "Indian gift" and withdrawn. If the preference was freely given, as Sir Wilfrid and the Finance Minister said at its inception, how can we afterward demand a quid pro quo? Of course Canadian interests must be guarded. Canada First is a proper motto for Canadians. But we cannot bully the Mother Country. We have no right to dictate to her in the matter of tariffs, just as we would accept no dictation in regard to our own tariff from Britain or elsewhere. It would appear that there has been something of a spirit of petulance displayed on our part in this matter where a more diplomatic course might have been at once more dignified and have better served the interests of all concerned.

**BRITAIN, RUSSIA AND THE STATES.**

Russian occupation of Manchuria and her broken promise to get out looks badly in the eyes of Britain. But equally Great Britain's occupation of Egypt during the past twenty years, and in spite of Mr. Gladstone's pledge to withdraw, appears like a breach of faith to Russia and Turkey to say nothing of France and other interested powers. Of course, British occupation and administration in Egypt have been of incalculable benefit to the people there, but if the end justifies the means it may be possible that Russia in Manchuria may bring about a better order of things than would have existed under the stupid, non-progressive rule of Peking. Russia builds railways at least, in Manchuria, just as Britain builds huge irrigation dams across the Nile.

Not long since a revolution in the Hawaiian Islands, assisted from the United States, resulted in the overthrow of the native monarchy, and eventually in the annexation of the islands to the big Republic. Now another revolution in Panama is under way which has so far resulted in the independence of the Isthmian Province and may end as in the case of Hawaii. Panama will probably be benefited greatly should it come under American control, and the construction of the great ship canal for which the world is waiting will be facilitated. But will the end justify the means? Is it not true that the nations are all more or less lawless? Are we not too ready to condemn in other nations acts of interference and aggression which to them may appear quite as defensible as the British occupation of Egypt?

King Edward was sixty-two years of age yesterday. By His Majesty's own desire the official celebration of his birthday takes place from year to year on Victoria Day, 24th May.

The Guardian is informed that an offer of increased salary but not the full amount asked for, has been made to ex-Inspector Jenkins, and there is some hope that his valuable services may be again secured for the enforcement of the prohibitory law.

The German Emperor has been operated upon for what is said to be a polypus in his throat. His father died from cancer of the throat fifteen years ago, and the fact has caused some apprehensions lest the trouble with which Emperor William is now afflicted might prove serious. It is announced that the operation was entirely successful, but involves the necessity of silence until the wound from the operation is healed.

Mark Twain has related that when he was ill and consulted a doctor he was told that "all his Latin parts were affected." We are reminded of this by learning from Captain Rea's letter in The Examiner that he is not feeling well. His English and his Latin are alike demoralised. Say, "Verbatim et literatim," and not "verbatim ad literatim," Captain. And there is no English word spelled "obscene," Captain. Nor is it good English to say "eat a surfelt." Besides when you write on the hog question and are not feeling well, Captain, you are liable to become something of a bore, also to shrink in your political weight. 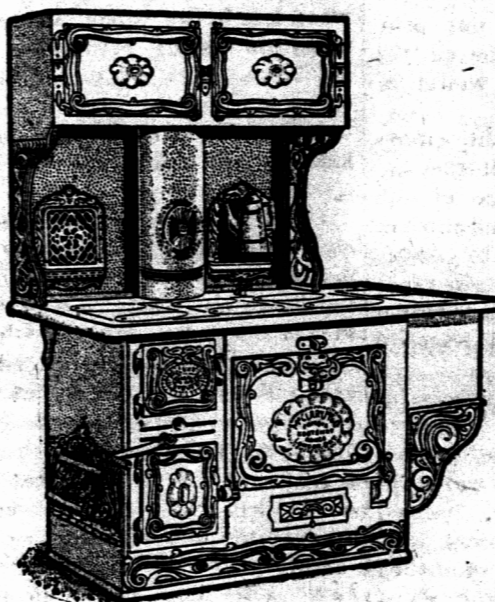
