NATION-WIDE RAILWAY STRIKE THREATENED

Unions Have Called for Strike on September 4. President Asks Congress for Drastic Legislation. Government to Take Over Operation of Roads.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) WASHINGTON, August 31.—The situation before Congress in an address to both houses assembled in joint session. The President told Congress of his efforts to bring railroad managers and the men into some sort of agreement, and saying he was powerless to do more, he asked Congress to enact certain specific legislation to deal with the situation now and in the future.

RING OF FIRE AND STEEL NOW SURROUNDS GERMANS

South of Martiniuch British Extended Line ITALIANS REPEL AUSTRIAN ATTACKS

(Canadian Press Despatch.) LONDON, August 30.—The official communication from general headquarters issued at midnight reads: "South of Martiniuch we extended our line across a small salient, capturing some prisoners, the number of whom has not been ascertained. Thirty-eight other prisoners were taken in minor operations."

GERMANS THREATEN REVENGE ON PRISONERS

Have Complained to Russia of Alleged Ill-treatment of German Prisoners and State that Reprisals will be Commenced After a Fixed Date.

(Special to the Guardian.) BERLIN, Aug. 31.—The German Government according to the Overseas News Agency, has addressed a vigorous protest to the Russian Government against the barbarous treatment of prisoners of war, and has asked for an immediate cessation thereof.

DUKE OF DEVONSHIRE DINED WITH CANADIANS

At Dinner Given by Col. Morden in Honour of Sir Sam Hughes "A Man of Whom Every Briton Has Reason to be Proud."

Strike Will Put U. S. Newspapers Out of Business

NEW YORK, Aug. 30.—A very large number of daily newspapers will be forced to suspend publication on account of lack of paper if a nation-wide railroad strike continues for two weeks, it was declared today by Lincoln B. Palmer, manager of the American Newspaper Publishers' Association.

Greek Army Will Be Mobilized
