DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

Walter Anderson 2.01 1-4, son of the old warrior Single G., and his fastest performer to date, suffered a broken leg in an accident and will be out of racing on account of it.

It is not always the price you pay for a yearling at the Old Glory Sale that counts in future performances. Some of the highest priced fall to reach the winner's end of the purse, while those sold at insignificant figures often become champions. In this column I have quoted many examples and here are a couple more that have appeared in the headlines in big black letters recently. Greyhound 1.57 1-4, sold for \$900 as a yearling. Twilight Song, this year's best bet in the two-year-old futurities, was led out of the auction by Will Strang after he had tendered \$100 for her.

Harness racing will be held at several Maritime points on Monday. At Charlottetown the Colt Futurity Races for two, three and four-year-olds with a 2.15 Trot and Classified Trot and Pace will provide a good afternoon's sport. At North Sydney the Ballard's Exhibition and harness races will be in full swing, while Halifax will also hold a meet. It will soon be the end of the trail in the Maritimes, with Fredericton following on September 15th, 16th and 17th; Woodstock the following week and then Halifax the latter part of September and first days of October. Then the curtain will ring down again and everyone will gather around the hot stove circuit and talk about the might-have-beens.

Will Gahagan, Secretary of the Trotting Horse Club of America, advises that the Club will sponsor four stakes for aged performers on the Grand Circuit in 1937. The All-American Stake for trotters regardless of age, record or money winnings for a purse of \$25,000; the Pacing Derby for pacers regardless of age, record or money winnings; also for a purse of \$25,000; the Champion Stake for trotters regardless of age, record or money winnings for a purse of \$10,000, and the Single G. Stake for pacers regardless of age, record or money winnings, for a purse of \$10,000.

The two \$25,000 events, one for trotters and one for pacers will each be a one and one-half mile dash and the money division will be 45 per cent, 20 per cent, 10 per cent, 10 per cent and 7 per cent and 6 per cent, with entries closing October 10th, 1936 and with a payment of \$50.00. There is a further payment of \$200 on January 1st, 1937, one of \$250 on March 1st and a starting fee the day before the race of \$500.

The two \$10,000 events will be raced mile heats with the same money division, best two in three. The closing date for these stakes is also October 10th when a payment of \$500.00 is due, with \$100 January 1st, \$100 March 1st and a starting fee the day before the race of \$200.

Rutland, Vermont, the king-pin fair of that state, opens next week with a big purse for Free-for-All pacers, seven \$500 purses and two \$300 purses. The top trotters and pacers that are following the Green Mountain Circuit will be there and as it is a very fast track one can expect some starting time. It is expected that Calumet Budlong 2.02 1-4 will be one of the starters in the Free-for-All.

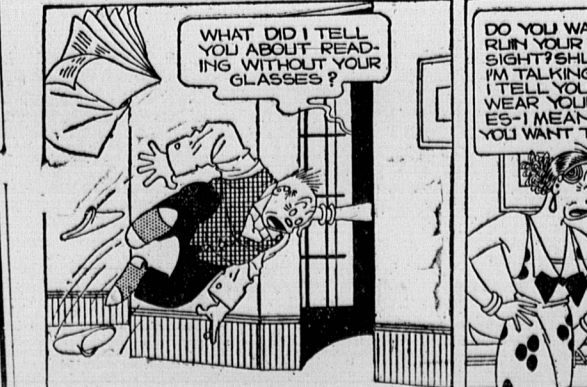
Yesterday the Metropolitan Driving Club sponsored an all amateur reinmen's meet at the million dollar running track, Suffolk Downs near Boston. Trophies and ribbons were awarded the winners in the various events and the best amateur drivers in the eastern states took part. The track was put in condition by Will Leese, former Grand Circuit trainer and is said to be very fast.

Presque Isle, one of the oldest of the Main fairs, starts its harness racing on Monday with the big conference of horses from all over the State of Maine. Saint Stephen fair is on this week.

The two-year-old record for trotting fillies over a half-mile track which had stood for ten years to the credit of Ruth M. Chenault at 2.09 3-4, was lowered last week at Middletown, N.Y., when E. Roland Harriman's filly Fawn won in 2.09 flat. She will be remembered as stepping the fastest mile ever trotted by a two-year-old in June, with Mrs. Harriman driving.

Mrs. Fabyan Eliminated From Singles Play By 20-year-old May Sulton

(By Scotty Reston, Associated Press Sports Writer) FOREST HILLS, N.Y., Sept. 4.—(AP)—Dorothy Bundy, 20-year-old daughter of May Sulton who won the title in 1907, today eliminated Mrs. Sarah Palfrey of Cambridge, Mass., second ranking player in the United States, from the women's tennis championships, as most favorites advanced.

Fred Perry of England and Don Budge of Oakland, Calif., favorites in the men's championship, both won their matches. Perry beat Ernest Sutter, United States intercollegiate champion, 8-6, 6-2, 6-1, and Budge eliminated Gardner Mulloy of Miami, 4-6, 6-2, 6-0, 6-1.

Both Sutter and Mulloy put up a brave fight in the first set and played just well enough to sumner the best Perry and Budge could give. Thereafter, however, there was nothing to either match. In the last two sets, Perry simply flashed around the court, and for all of Sutter's shrewd anticipation, Perry was too mercilessly fast for him.

Vagabond King Wins Grand Circuit Event

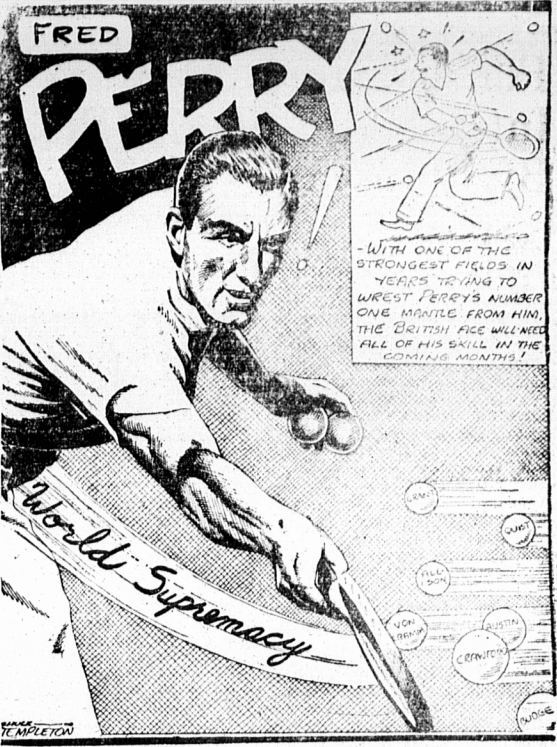
COLUMBUS, O., Sept. 3.—(AP)—Vagabond King, from the Adolph Wilson stables of Dayton, trotted to victory over a heavy track today in the Governor's Cup Stake, feature event of the day's Grand Circuit program.

The gelding, piloted skillfully by Otto Eskline, won the first heat in 2:19 and the second in 2:17 1-4, both times beating Glova, driven by Dr. H. M. Parshall.

Prize money of \$1,000 was divided among the winners. Steel won the 2:37 class in 2:37, 2:38 1-4, 2:33 3-4, after George Essary's Whistler won the first two heats in 2:39, 2:37 1-2; Peter Carroll's Peabody, third. A. C. Bell's Dinah, driven by Atherton, won the three year old class in 2:55 1-2, 2:52 2:47; N. Lee's Nellie Bly, second. T. Wiman's Hermona, Jas. Breyer's Millionaire, driven by Coughlan; Tommie Bras, Peatie, (Redden and Brown); H. Horne's Masonic Pilot and S. A. Hooper's Starlight (Henderson) also started. On the second day Whistler won the 2:45 class in 2:42, 2:42 1-2, 2:38 1-2, with Boodler second and G. W. Hibber's Honest John, third. The stakes race for \$300 and a silver cup presented by John J. 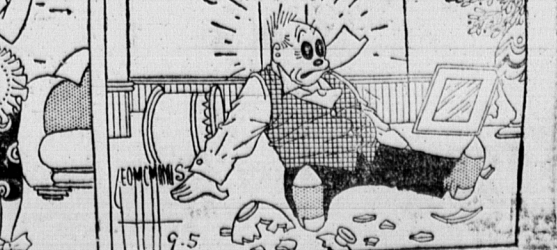
