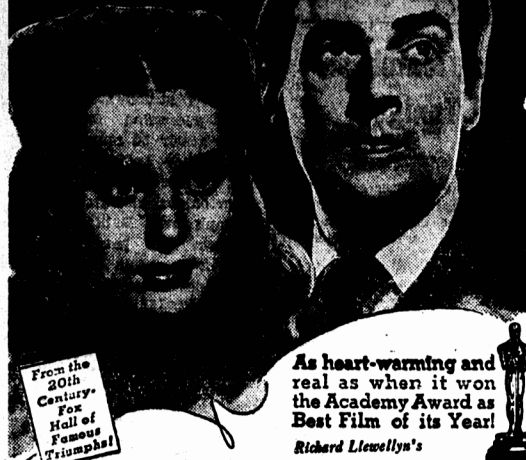

DELINQUENCY ON TRIAL

"Dangerous Years," the unusual juvenile delinquency film, produced by Sol M.
