THE PULPLESS TOOTH IS A MENACE TO HEALTH

The question often arises as to whether certain teeth from which the nerve or pulp has been removed are causing or likely to cause trouble to the body. So often have these pulpless teeth been shown to be the cause of rheumatism or arthritis, heart disease, both of the valves and of the heart muscle itself, of ulcer of the stomach and of first part of the small intestine, of nephritis or inflammation of the kidneys, of bladder, kidney, and gall stones, and of chronic inflammation of the muscles, that Dr. Charles Mayo the noted surgeon, and Dr. Weston Price, the outstanding dental research specialist, both advise that they should be removed.

One feature of the report just made to the Board of Railway Commissioners regarding railway casualties of all kinds during the month of August is noteworthy.

It is that in twenty-three accidents at highway crossings thirteen persons were killed and 34 injured. If the Quebec law which commands that automobile drivers shall stop before passing over the railway tracks at highway crossings were common throughout the country, few level-crossing accidents would take place, and if the law were rightly observed there might not be any at all.

The board for the great game of naval strategy is being set. It is not as if any nation wants to fight.

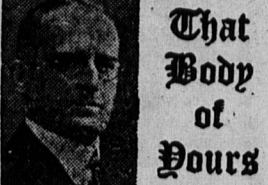
That each of the Great Powers desires is to get its own way. With this supremely patriotic end in view the Japanese Fleet has been built almost to treaty limits; the United States is following suit, and Great Britain shows no intention of being caught napping.

Eager to arouse mob feeling, its spokesmen have used very wild language. One of them recently stated that if the C.C.F. achieves office "God Save the King" will no longer be sung. Another has said that the Governor-General will be sent back to England; still another, that Socialism will be taught in the schools—and that, of course, means Communism.

The Government, says the Dublin Weekly Times, has drifted into an almost untenable position.

The truth is that although some farmers will not be able to use for new spending all the money they are now receiving, their new money will create increased spending in some other quarters. And so in other lines of activity when people are receiving money which they must largely use to pay old bills.

That Body of Yours

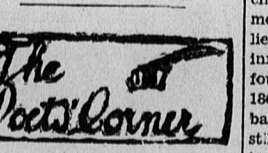
Now a good looking pulpless tooth may not be doing any harm to the system. By using every available test—X-ray, chemical, testing for organisms, removing some of nearby tissues—nothing can be found that shows that the tooth should be removed.

What are you to do then if outstanding men like Drs. Mayo and Price advise removal, and a member of the dental faculty of Illinois University says that they can be rendered safe from infecting the body?

It is not such a contradiction as it seems. Dr. Galile admits that each case requires a great deal of attention, absolute perfection of detail as to prevention of infection, microscopic examination of tissue, and careful following up after the work is done.

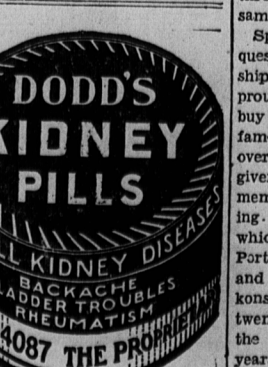
It means that in addition to skill and care, there must be laboratory, X-ray, chemical and other examinations, and your dentist, while having the knowledge, is not possessed of the necessary equipment.

In other words, for the great majority of us, the pulpless tooth is a menace to health, and should be removed.

The Cutty Sark

"Cutty Sark", the fastest and most famous of all white-winged clipper ships, is today one of P. & O.'s greatest attractions as she lies motionless at her buoy in the inner harbor. Despite her sixty-four years, for she was built in 1869 by Scott and Linton of Dumbarton, the "Cutty Sark" might still be taken for a brand new ship, in such perfect condition does her owner keep her.

Including the cost of the ship which he bought back from the Portuguese for some four thousand pounds, Captain Downman reckons that he has spent about twenty-two thousand pounds on the clipper during the last eleven years. Witchcraft In Germany

In Spadaw, where the golden war fund of the German Empire was kept for years, a case of witchcraft has just come to official attention. The London Times reports it from the official records of the Berlin police court in which the facts were brought to light.

An aged lamplighter and his wife, after years of reasonably happy domestic life, were oppressed by a lodger who refused to leave their home. They took counsel of a woman reputed to be a witch. This woman, after collecting a fee of 20 marks, mixed salt and flour together, and with impressive incantations incomprehensible to others, stirred the mixture with a straw and sprinkled it about the lodger's room. Three days later the lodger moved out.

Naturally, the success of this proceeding deeply impressed the lamplighter and his wife. The witch at once capitalized her enhanced standing. The evidence shows that she told the lamplighter his wife was guilty of treachery to him, and told the wife that the lamplighter was given to shocking dissipations. Within a few weeks she obtained 300 marks from the lamplighter; he and his wife engaged in an orgy of potions, spells and enchantments. In one instance the witch advised the wife to administer human blood to the lamplighter; three drops were supplied by a friend of the witch at a cost of 9 marks.

The witch swore her dupes to secrecy, telling them that they would be stricken dead if they told anybody of their traffic with the powers whose agent she was. This closed their mouths for a time, but eventually the lamplighter, in desperation, consulted a sorcerer, who advised him to confront the wife and have a final settlement of affairs with her.

The record ends on a satisfactory note. Enraged by the story his wife told him, the lamplighter gave a sound beating to the witch. This brought the matter within the province of officialdom. The witch was sentenced to fifteen months' imprisonment, her friend who supplied the blood to one month and the sorcerer to six weeks. Why the sorcerer was punished is not made clear; the available facts are in his favor, probably some element of the case is omitted from the article. The incident furnishes new evidence, unhappily not necessary, of the persistence of superstition, even where the best opportunities to extirpate it have been at hand.

The German Elections

The demand of the Hitler Government for equality with other countries no doubt makes a strong appeal to German national sentiment and has the support of the German people. But how can the election which is to be held on November 12 be a true indication of German opinion? That election will be as unlike an election in Canada as anything could possibly be.

Those entitled to vote are people of German blood—men and women over 20 years of age. The rights of citizenship having been withdrawn from those who are not of the German race, including the Jews, they lose the right to vote. But the Socialists, and even the Communists, have the right to vote as individuals.

There will be a great effort to induce all the electors to support the government because of its foreign policy. There may be an attempt to drag unwilling electors, and some of the Socialists and Communists may vote from fear of trouble if they do not do so. But how many of the 10 or 12 millions who belonged to those parties can be induced or forced to vote? The completeness of the demonstration depends on this.
