RUSSIAN SQUADRON SEEN AND CANNONADING HEARD

Japs Gain a Better Position—Major Kuroku Dead—More British Ships Seized—Russia's Reply to Britain—Another Vessel Taken

RUSSIAN SQUADRON SEEN.

TOKIO, July 23.—(Special)—The Vladivostok Squadron was seen on Friday 30 miles off Hlache Provinces, Japan. CANNONADING WAS HEARD.

It is rumored from Wraga, the clearance port of the junk trade for Tokio, that cannonading at sea was heard there.

JAPS GAIN BETTER POSITIONS.

KUROKIS HEAD QUARTERS, July 23.—(Special)—The result of five days activity is that the Japanese have secured better strategic lines for advance and the Russians have lost their best defensive position, both on the Liao Yang and Mukden roads.

ONE SIDED ARTILLERY DUEL.

Four Russian guns shelled our Japanese positions for hours this morning without result. The Japanese guns remain silent.

MAJOR KUROKU DEAD.

Major Kuroku was wounded and has died. He was attached to the British army in the Boer war.

PASS HELD BY JAPANESE.

SIN TAIN, July 23.—(Special)—According to reports from Chinese sources Sigou Pass, ten miles north of Salmatza is held by more than 5,000 Japanese.

JAP REINFORCEMENTS SENT.

It is believed this column has engaged

a Russian force proceeding from Saima tza westward.

The Japanese are sending up reserves to reinforce Sigou Pass and the column there expects to push forward.

TORRENTS OF RAIN FALLING.

TA TCHU KIAO, July 23.—(Special)—Rain has been falling in torrents for two days and the movements of both Russians and Japanese are suspended. The real rainy season seems to have set in.

MORE BRITISH SHIPS SEIZED.

LONDON, July 23.—(Special)—The Russian Ambassador has been ordered to notify Great Britain of the seizure of two more British ships in the Red Sea and the same procedure followed as in the case of the Malacca.

THE RUSSIAN REPLY.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 23.—(Special)—The Russian reply to the British protest agrees that the Malacca shall not be brought before a prize court and undertakes that no similar incident shall occur in the future.

HAMBURG AMERICAN STEAMER SEIZED.

SUEZ, July 23.—(Special)—Hamburg-American Steamer Scandia, seized by the Russians in the Red Sea has arrived here.

NOW FLOATS RUSSIAN FLAG.

She floats the Russian flag is commanded by a Russian naval officer and is manned by a naval crew. She will enter the canal.

W. A. HICKMAN ON GEOGRAPHY

Of the Dominion and its Relation to Empire

An Encyclopedia of Information Presented in Attractive Form with Colored Photographs.

Some Geographical Aspects of Canada and their relation to Imperial Federation was the subject of W. A. Hickman's lecture before the Summer School of Science on Saturday evening. To many the title may have been unattractive. Under Mr. Hickman's skilful treatment and illustrated by superb and well selected views it held the close and undivided attention of his auditory for two hours and ten minutes.

The introduction showed the vast importance of Canada's position in the Empire. The illustrated portion of the lecture gave a series of colored views representing typical scenes in the Maritime Provinces (mainly of New Brunswick) of Ontario and Quebec, of the Northwest divided into the prairie country, the ranching country and the park lands, and finally the mountain section and the Pacific coast. A vast fund of information was presented with these views, which were colored to natural tints and very beautiful.

The lecture was admirably calculated to inform those present in regard to their own country, to make them proud of it and to realise its importance to the Empire and the world.

Dr. Anderson in eulogistic terms moved the vote of thanks which James McIsaac of The Herald cordially seconded.
