Sox Increase Lead Beating Indians As Yankees Lose 8-3

Boston Red Sox looked more than ever like champions yesterday as they roared up from behind on the murderous bats of Mike Higgins and Yogi Berra to trounce Cleveland Indians 10-3 and stretch their American League lead to 10 1/2 games.
While hurricane Hal Newhouse and the thundering bats of his Detroit teammates were cooling New York Yankees 8-3, the socking Sox racked up their 12th victory in a row, their 19th straight home win against western rivals and their 41st back entry in 50 games.
They pounded three Indian hurfers for 14 hits and a total of 28 bases, including Ted Williams' fifth homer, Yogi's eighth and Higgins' first. Higgins also walked to the plate and slammed out a triple and two singles while driving in six runs, and Yogi went four for four, including a pair of two-baggers.

To Dismiss Charges

WASHINGTON, June 11 (AP)—The National Labor Relations Board today advised its regional office in Pittsburgh to dismiss unfair labor relations charges filed by the American Baseball Guild against the Pittsburgh club of the National League.
An N.L.R.B. official told reporters that the regional office was advised "not to hold formal hearings at this time which could involve question of possible jurisdiction over professional baseball teams."
The guild also has a petition before the N. L. R. B. asking certification of the guild as the collective bargaining representative of the Pittsburgh players.
Both the petition (for an election) and the charges will be dismissed if they are not withdrawn by the N.L.R.B. said.

Jet Engine To Be Used In Record Attempt

LONDON, June 11—Sir Malcolm Campbell said tonight that he will use a jet engine in an attempt next autumn to smash his own world speedboat record. Sir Malcolm set the record at 141 miles per hour in August 1930, on Lake Coniston in the English Lake district.
Sir Malcolm said a jet engine never before has been fitted to a boat, and that "catastrophic tests" now are being carried out in a tank and a wind tunnel.
"Aerodynamics play a very big part in the speeds we hope to reach," he explained.
