

Trans Canada Air Express Services Greatly Extended

MONTREAL, Que., June 11.—The extension of the Trans-Canada Air Lines transcontinental route to Victoria brings to 24 the number of points in Canada for which air express service is provided by Canada's national air line according to an announcement made by G. E. Bellrose, General Manager of TCA express services.

Mr. Bellrose stated that arrangements are in effect between Trans-Canada Air Lines and the Pan-American Airways for the transportation of traffic in air express service between points in Canada and those served by the Pan-American Airways in Cuba, Central and South America, as well as certain islands in the Caribbean Sea.
