That Body Of Yours

TESTING LIVING LIVER TISSUE

So important is the liver to health that a few years ago I found myself writing about the liver at least once or twice a month. The saying "life depends on the liver" is true even as also is the statement health depends on the liver. Health depends on the liver is because of the many jobs it does in the body: (a) Manufacturing bile, Nature's purgative, which breaks up fats for absorption into the blood; (b) storing bile in gall bladder for future use; (c) storing sugar for future use; (d) manufacturing material to help make blood and; (e) filtering out poisons and harmful organisms from the blood as the blood passes through it.

I have spoken before of the tests made on the liver to find out how well it is doing its various jobs, and what and how damage is occurring. These are called liver function tests. One of these tests is the hippuric acid test in which 1.77 grams of sodium benzoate is injected into a vein and urine is collected for one hour after the injection. Thus within one hour the ability of the liver to remove hippuric acid is found.

One of the latest methods of finding the actual condition of the liver tissues is biopsy—the examination of a piece of "living" tissue removed from the body.

In the "Journal of the American Medical Association," Drs. R. C. Cogswell, L. Schiff, S. A. Safai, D. F. Richfield, C. W. Kump, and E. A. Gall, Cincinnati, report that during the past four years, needle biopsy (removing a small piece of the liver by means of a special needle) was used 403 times on 345 patients. There were no deaths and no need for blood transfusions in any of these cases. Needle biopsy was used in the following kinds of cases: (1) Enlargement of the liver where cause is unknown; (2) need for distinction between the two kinds of jaundice; (3) growths—cancer and others. Thus cancer of the liver was shown by means of needle biopsy in 41 of 53 cases. The excellent results obtained in the 345 cases of needle biopsy with no deaths and no need for blood transfusions, were due to the careful selection of the patients used in the tests.

Cook's Corner

BREAD AND BUTTER PICKLES

Six large cucumbers, 3 onions, ¼ cup salt, 4 cups water, 1 cup vinegar, 1 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon celery seed, 1 teaspoon mustard seed, ½ teaspoon turmeric, ½ teaspoon ginger, ¼ teaspoon pepper.

Wash cucumbers, peel, if desired; peel onions. Slice thin and let stand in brine of salt and water for three hours. Drain, rinse under cold water. Combine remaining ingredients and bring to a boil; add cucumbers and onions and stir over low heat two minutes. Turn into jars; seal. Makes 2½ pints.

PEPPER RELISH

12 red peppers, chopped; 12 green peppers chopped; 12 onions, chopped; 2 cups vinegar; 1 cup firmly packed brown sugar; 2 tablespoons salt; 2 tablespoons celery seed.

Drain peppers and onions, cover with boiling water and simmer 15 minutes. Drain again and add vinegar, sugar, salt and celery seed. Boil 15 minutes and pour into hot sterilized jars, filling to overflowing, and seal at once. Makes four half-pint jars.
