not nearly so well suited to people from the Old Country as those of the Maritimes, where there is mixed farming, and where the scenery and climate suit them better. Mr. Machin was able to give illustrations of farming conditions in England which appear to bear out his assertion that if Prince Edward Island had the right sort of representation in England a good many farmers would be found willing to migrate to the Island. He added that the farmer in the Old Land works twelve or fourteen hours per day, and if he did that in this country he would soon put money in the bank.

It may be assumed that Mr. Hyndman with the great energy that has marked his efforts to advance the interests of not only Prince Edward Island, but of the Maritimes in recent years, will continue the agitation until definite results are achieved. The Island province can absorb many farmers of the right type, but there must be organization to attract them in the first place, and to see that they are given every opportunity on arrival to establish themselves as prosperous members of the community.

Seeking Immigrants

(St. John Telegraph Journal.) Mr. J. O. Hyndman, in an address delivered before the Rotary Club of Charlottetown, this week made a very strong plea for a progressive immigration policy in Prince Edward Island, controlled by a department established for that purpose. Mr. Hyndman quite agreed with those who urge that means should be devised to keep more of our own boys and girls at home, but pointed out that even under ideal conditions a certain number will decide to emigrate, and there is need of action to increase the population of the province by a judicious policy of immigration. That this is a sound view would seem to be indicated by the figures of population of Prince Edward Island, since 1891. In that year the population was 109,078; in 1901 it was 103,259; in 1911 it had dropped to 93,792, and in 1921 to 88,536.

Nobody will question the assertion that Prince Edward Island is prosperous at the present time, but that does not meet the objection that it has been losing population, and that production in the province could be enormously increased if there were more people of the right kind upon the land.

Mr. Hyndman cited New Denmark in New Brunswick as a home for hundreds of families from Denmark, who like the Maritimes, and find conditions entirely to their satisfaction. Nova Scotia, he pointed out, is seeking to get immigrants from Scandinavia, and he declared Prince Edward Island should follow the example of the other two Maritime Provinces. To do the work satisfactorily, he would have an immigration and publicity department. He quoted an official of the Hudson Bay Company Overseas Settlement Board to the effect that they would not send out settlers unless there were some proper department to look after them when they arrived.

The necessity for such provision was set forth by another speaker, Samuel Machin, an English farmer, now settled on the Island. He said the Government had a far view for him when he first arrived in the province, but it was too costly, and he spent five weeks in Charlottetown without finding anybody whose business it was to help him or do anything for him. He was thinking of pulling up stakes and going West, but through the kindness of Mr. Hyndman and another he had become satisfactorily located. He had since visited the West, but the conditions there were

for winter effect, is a yellow-barked sport of the Huntingdon Willow and is botanically known as Salix alba vitellina. As its name indicates, Salix alba, nova penultima, the Golden Niobe Willow is a further sport, and all grow to be large trees. I have here the "Niobe" but am somewhat doubtful how it will react to our silver thaws, which in general are injurious to trees with pendulous branches. There is also a red-barked sport which would be worth trying. Unfortunately during the past two seasons the willows here have suffered from what appears to be a fungoid disease or blight, and many have died out.

According to the press, the muskrats built no "nests" last Fall, and the weather-wise predicted a mild winter in consequence. The fact is, animals live very much in the present; few take thought for the future; and because the Fall was mild the little animals did not trouble to make nests, and now when unable to procure the materials, they have become as playful as a kitten, become a winter storm, long before the barometer gives sign of an approach-

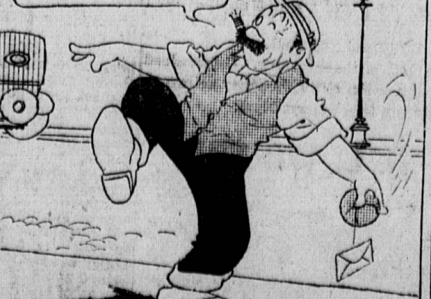
