**VALUE OF THE CANADIAN MARKET.**

In 1903 Canada imported from the United States products and merchandise of the value of \$137,005,195, and from Great Britain a value of \$58,890,901. These are big figures. They show the value of the Canadian market to the great trading nations of the earth. The ordinary reader who does not readily grasp the meaning of all these millions may be aided by a few statements by way of elucidation.

What is the value of the Canadian market to the people of the United States? This much at least, that the great Republic sells more goods to Canada than to Asia, Africa, Oceania and Central America combined. Think of that! The less than six millions of Canadians buy more American goods than the 860 millions of Asia, with the 157 millions of Africa and the millions of Oceania and Central America thrown in. The six millions of Canadian people are worth more to the United States than the thousand odd millions above indicated. Is not this a striking fact?

Turn now to Britain. She is selling us this year a value of about 60 million dollars. That is half as much as she sells to the United States, which has fourteen times the population of Canada. That is, if Britain sold as much per head to the people of the United States as she sells per head to the people of Canada her sales to the Republic would be close on to a billion dollars a year. This method of statement may help us to see the value of the Canadian market to Great Britain, and also how much it means to the Mother Country that Canada is under the British flag and not under the Stars and Stripes.

One of the matters over which Governments and Parliaments have large control is the volume of our trade with various countries. By means of the customs tariff, by making the rates of duty high or low, much can be done to encourage or to restrict trade in any given quarter. Britain receives all our products free of duty. The United States militates against us with a tariff twice as high as our own. The Flag and Government of Britain are our own Flag and Government. The Flag and Government of the United States are alien and foreign. Which ought we to favor in moulding our customs tariff? And is it not time to teach the people of the United States that we know the value of our own market?

**THE NORTH SEA OUTRAGE.**

The investigation in England of the circumstances connected with the North Sea outrage has made it clear that the Russian pretence of being attacked by torpedo craft, Japanese or otherwise, is a pure fabrication. One fisherman skipper gave his testimony that the Russian officers acted like "demons possessed," and strengthens the general British belief that they were drunk at the time of the outrage. One of the Russian war vessels was so close to the fishermen that the latter could hear the bugle calls ordering the men to quarters. At such distance and with the aid of powerful search lights it would be impossible to mistake the fishing vessel for torpedo craft. The suspicion that the Russian officers acted from drunken fright is confirmed by the comparative harmlessness of their fire. In twenty minutes cannonade they only succeeded in sinking one of the fishing fleet, killing two men and wounding eighteen or twenty. One battleship or cruiser manned by sober officers and men might well have sent twenty of the fishing fleet to the bottom in that time.

**A PERTINENT INQUIRY.**

The present Government of Prince Edward Island in response to the popular demand enacted the Prohibitory Liquor Law. They stand by that enactment and lend assistance to the enforcement of the law. What is the policy of the Opposition party in regard to Prohibition? In The Guardian of the 8th instant we invited Mr. Mathieson to give satisfactory assurances of his attitude on this great question. We have not heard from him as yet. We have read his public utterances on various questions but find him so far silent in regard to this. We admit that he is not bound to speak if he chooses not to speak. But he cannot prevent the large and influential body of temperance people in Prince Edward Island from placing their own construction on his silence if it is continued. The Government is on record in favor of Prohibition as against License. We again respectfully invite the Opposition leader to define his position. For politics, as between the two parties The Guardian cares nothing. We do care greatly that the Prohibitory Law shall not be tampered with.
