Q When will preserves coupons
P16 and P17 become valid?
A Preserves coupons P16 and
P17 will become valid September 20.

Q What is the coupon value of
extracted honey?
A One preserves coupon is good
for 2 pounds of extracted honey.

Q When will butter coupon 123
become valid?
A Butter coupon 123 will become
valid September 27th.

Q What is the coupon value of
blended table syrup?
A One preserves coupon is worth
18 ounces of blended table syrup.

Q Some friends tell me I can

A No. Dairy butter is rationed

GIRL NEEDS EDUCATION

Postwar Conditions May Require
Special Talents In Women

DEAR DOROTHY DIX: I have a chance to go to college and study
the profession I have always been interested in, but I feel that I would
be letting my boy friend down if I went to college while he is over-
seas, instead of staying at home and working for his return. Would I?

ANSWER: Your individual labor will do little to speed your boy
friend's return. So I strongly advise you to take advantage of the op-
portunity you have to go to college and study the
profession that you would like to follow. It has
been a fine and patriotic thing for you to do your
bit in helping your country in its hour of need by
doing any work that came to hand, but now you
can best serve it by making yourself an educated
woman, fitted to do work that will be just as im-
portant as making airplanes and munitions has
been.

I wish that girls could be made to appreciate
that now the war is over so many of them will face a world that will be

COOK'S CORNER

Green-Tomato and Onion Pickles

1 1/2 cups granulated sugar
3 cups clear vinegar
1/2 cup salt
2 tablespoons white or yellow
mustard seeds
2 teaspoon whole allspice
1 teaspoon whole cloves
4 quarts unpeeled green tomatoes,
cut in 1/2 inch slices (1 lb.)
1 1/2 quarts sliced, peeled medium
onions (1 lb.)

Combine first 4 ingredients. Add
allspice and cloves, tie in a chine-
sion bag. Bring to boil. Add on-
ions and onions; bring to boil, and
cook, uncovered, 5 minutes, or until
just tender. To cook evenly, in-
slices from bottom of kettle to sur-
face during cooking. Remove im-
mediately after seal according to
manufacturer's directions. Makes
about 6 quarts.

Bread-and-Butter Pickles
Wash and cut cucumbers in thin
slices until there are ten cups.
Peel onions and cut in thin slices
until there are two cups. Arrange
the slices of onions and cucumbers
alternately and cover generously
with salt; allow to stand an hour
or two. Drain off the liquid and
put the mixture into a kettle. Add
two cups of vinegar, two cups of
sugar, two teaspoons of turmeric
powder, two red peppers, and two
sweet green peppers. Heat the mix-
ture to the boiling point and cook
for twenty minutes. Stir often. If
desirable, add a little more sugar
to taste. Put into hot jars, seal
and seal. This recipe makes a little
over two quarts of pickle.

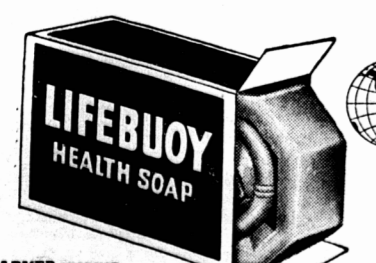
