**SUMMERSIDE IGNORED.**

back to port upon two occasions, having gone as far down as Carleton, reporting that the Straits were completely jammed with ice, no leads, no possibility of landing at Tormentine Pier, when we were prepared to prove by those on board, and others living at Carleton, Cape Traverse and Cape Tormentine, that many leads appeared off Seven Mile bay, and down to Cape Traverse, and across the Straits, with better landing than any other day during the winter. Another fine day the Stanley could not be put out in the Straits after 12 o'clock noon, but at last the Captain gave way, went over and was back in 4 1/2 hours.

The Stanley was subsequently permitted to go down to Charlottetown without any effort being made to reach Cape Tormentine, when about six miles southwest of it, with favorable leads in view. At this time he had not on board Commander Tooker's last chart of this harbor, and strange to say, I was unable to procure one myself at the Department of Marine & Fisheries at Ottawa; I was referred from Ottawa to Quebec city, but no chart being obtainable there, I was referred to Washington, United States, and there I procured a late chart of Summerside harbour. Sir Louis Davies, who was most active in having our harbour surveyed (which resulted in getting the last chart by Commander Tooker), would no doubt be surprised to learn that the charts were unobtainable in the regular way in Canada in 1902. Every custom house in the Maritime provinces should have been provided with them, and every steamer belonging to the Department should have been furnished with a copy. It does look as if we were ignored by the Deputy Minister of Marine, who was in charge of the office most of the time these things occurred, and who, after "a careful study of the events," gives Capt. Brown much praise for his actions in the winter of 1903. The last trip made by the Stanley Dec. 28th, 1903, from here was a record one; with six miles of ice (the result of one night's severe frost, but no gale or snowstorm), twelve miles of open water, the good ship Stanley, with 125 pounds of steam, backed forty-one times to get out, and reached Cape Tormentine in five hours. Then the ice condition of Summerside harbor was communicated to the Department, and made to be sufficient reason for the Stanley's leaving for Georgetown. When she left the Cape, with open water, she carried 155 pounds of steam, or 30 pounds more than when ice-breaking in and off our harbour. The fact is, that the ice was not over ten inches thick at any place between here and Cape Tormentine, and never before or since, has this steamer been so long, under same conditions, in getting over the same number of miles.

In contrasting these efforts on behalf of Summerside with the efforts of this winter on behalf of the eastern route, we become amazed that it is possible for the one department, with the same set of players, to so well sustain the different parts assigned to each,—parts so opposite and so inconsistent with the others in this notorious force, and after all to compliment each other publicly, and claim their mutual duty had been done fairly well.

There are two ways to solve the problem (if it is a problem) of the winter service. One way is to pay a private company half the present net loss, and hand over to the company, free, both steamers; the company to perform the whole operation of carrying mails, passengers and freight; the Government to guard the public as against exorbitant rates for passengers or freight, by a maximum rate, or no higher than now prevails; the contractors to be free to elect any route that they deem best to secure the most prompt delivery of mails, passengers and freight to their (or its) destination, or in other words, to yield the most good to the most people.

The other way is to transfer the service from the Marine Department to the Railway Department.

The Government to buy or build a railroad to Cape Tormentine, the nearest point to Prince Edward Island,—in either case.

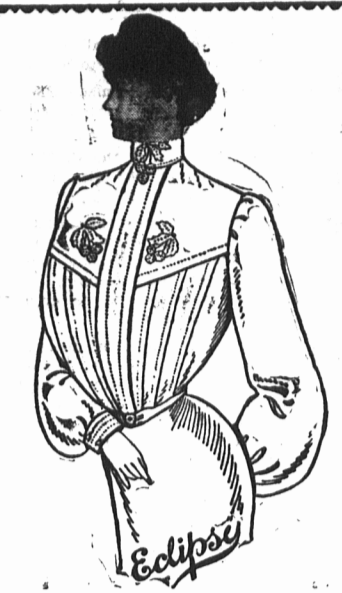
