HOLY HOUR—The regular monthly Holy Hour devotion was observed in Saint Dunstan's Cathedral last evening. The ceremony which is impressive and very beautiful was conducted last night by Rev. A. J. MacIntyre, who also preached an eloquent sermon on the Most Blessed Sacrament. St. Dunstan's Male Choir sang most pleasingly.

EARLY MORNING FIRE CALL—Night watchman, Mr. Thomas McMahon, sent in an alarm of fire about 1.30 this morning when he noticed some smoke issuing from a rear window of the Bank of Nova Scotia, corner of Grafton and Great George Street. The firemen responded quickly and soon had what might have developed into a bad blaze under control. A box of paper beneath the furnace caught fire in some way, but the prompt application of the chemical soon extinguished the blaze. There was no damage.

PROPERTY CHANGES HANDS—Mr. James Lonergan, restaurant proprietor of this city has purchased the premises and business conducted by Arbing and Barr under the name of Raney Gay and Co. at no. 9-11 Elm Avenue. NEAR COLLISION—Yesterday morning about 6 o'clock, a Nash car in the rear of a Pontiac car, attempted, and finally succeeded in passing the other car which suffered the loss of a front bumper when the driver turned the "silent policeman" to the right on Kent Street. The Nash did not pass away without some damage, the extent of which was a bent fender and a bad scare to the operator of the car. The Nash, it appears, cut in front of the Pontiac as it was turning the corner.

ST. JAMES CHURCH ARMISTICE SERVICE—A large congregation worshipped in St. James Church yesterday forenoon on the occasion of the special Armistice celebration. The service was impressively devout and inspiring throughout. Rarely, even in St. James has there been a more heart-stirring and mind-satisfying diet of worship. There was a full choir under Professor Methven, which gave a superb rendering of the musical service. This included anthems, "O Canada" and "The Recessional," the solo parts being taken by Miss Ida Muir, whose rich, young voice was never heard to better advantage. The Professor rendered two appropriate organ solos with fine effect. A prominent and impressive sermon, upholding in the message, was preached by the Minister, Rev. Bruce Muir, from the text: St. John 19:41: "Now in the place where He was crucified there was a garden." He emphasized that the only thing worth striving for was peace through sacrifice and usually, the outcome of a willing sacrifice.

RETURNED FROM MONTREAL—Mr. W. Chester MacIntyre and Col. D. A. MacKinnon have returned from Montreal, where they were in consultation with Governor Charles V. Sale, of the Hudson Bay Company, and also the Canadian directors of that firm. The matters discussed were in respect to furs and fur farming.

THE POLICE COURT—In the police court on Saturday the disorderly house case was adjourned till Tuesday. Evidence was heard in the case of the man who was charged with soliciting subscriptions for a nephew who had been burned out, and which subscriptions his nephew stated had not been turned over to him. Many witnesses testified that they subscribed sums varying from \$1.00 down to \$1.50. The accused elected a summary trial. In his own behalf, he stated that he had collected about \$45.00 or \$50.00, of which he claimed nearly all had been spent in buying articles for the use of his nephew, or in paying his railway fare, board, and other expenses during the six days he was in town collecting the money. The accused was represented by Mr. James Johnston, Junior, and the Crown by Mr. Claire Campbell. The case was adjourned until Tuesday next for judgment, and the accused remained to bail.

MAIL COURIERS DESIRE SALARY BASIS

The Mail Contractors Association are holding their annual convention on behalf of the contractors who belong to this province on Monday in the Board of Trade Rooms at 1 p. m. The chief feature of the convention will be the election of a committee to represent the contractors in the negotiations with the Government regarding the proposed new mail contract, or tendering system. It seems a very peculiar and singular condition that in all the service of government employment, these few hundred men engaged in the daily delivery of rural mail, and in the conveyance of mails from post offices to railway stations form the only part in the huge government service in which tendering by public competition is permitted. In every other branch of government service from the janitor to the highest official, every class of man employed enjoy a permanent salary basis of engagement, and always at a living wage, as for example the city letter carriers, who deliver on the city streets, the postal clerks of the city post office, the mail clerks on the train, the janitors, postmasters and post office inspectors as well as all other employees known to the government service in Railways, Customs, Public Works, Inland Revenue and all other governmental departments. The rural mail carriers are therefore struggling hard through their association effort before the government to be brought under the same fair conditions as those now enjoyed by the other branches of

THE SERVICE above referred to. During the last session of parliament the association's secretary, Mr. Garfield MacKinnon, canvassed thoroughly all the members of the House of Commons, and was successful in obtaining considerable support, several members of the Commons making strong speeches in the House urging the Postmaster-General to bring into effect the changes and improvements of conditions as asked for by the Association, chief among these is the removal of the contract system and the establishment in its place of a permanent basis of engagement at the rate of \$75.00 per year for the rural mail carriers, and for the short distance carriers who operate from post offices to railway stations, and for the collection of the town and city letter boxes, a substantial increase, equal to three times their present salary per year, is asked for. It may be mentioned in this regard, that their present contract distance is very short, and their income a very trifling amount, one entirely inadequate for the responsibility of the services rendered.
