SAYS FORKE IS OUT TO WRECK PROGRESSIVES NESBITT, Man., Sept. 10. — Robert Forke, former leader of the Progressive party, was accused of being "a party to a scheme to shatter the whole Progressive movement" by not telling them he would accept in a speech here last night by W.G. Rathwell, an ardent supporter of the Progressive party, that he had been nominated for the Liberal nomination three days later. He voted the expense of the present election upon the people and who ran under Progressive colors at Glenwood last year. Forke had been unfair to the rank and file of those who forsook former party affiliations and supported him. His vote on the Customs scandal was unforgivable. He failed in candor to the recent Progressive nominating convention in not telling them he would accept a Liberal nomination three days later. He voted the expense of the present election upon the people and who ran under Progressive colors at Glenwood last year. "He is now a party to a scheme to shatter the whole Progressive movement if he has not already done so. He has turned down the whole movement to secure his own personal election. His slogan, 'Defeat Beaulieu' the Conservative, is not a lofty ideal, nothing like the policies which Forke and I advocated in 1921."
