ence and a degree of Bachelor of Civic Law.
He was a Rhodes Scholar for Prince Edward Island and graduated from the University of Oxford in 1920, and entered Oxford University the same year.
Mr. Godfrey was president of the Nova Scotia Bar Association and president of the Nova Scotia Canadian Bar Association.
He was born in May, 1890, son of William Henry and Elizabeth (Mum) Godfrey, both of Suffolk, P.E.I.
At the completion of his law studies Mr. Godfrey read law with C. J. Burchell, K.C., and was called to the Bar of Nova Scotia in March, 1924. He was appointed King's Counselor in June, 1938.
At the time of his death he was senior partner with the firm of Godfrey and Wickwire, and up to the death of A. E. Silver in 1937, had been a partner in the firm of Silver and Godfrey. He was appointed Maritime member of the Board of Governors for the CBC in 1936 and held that post until 1944. Mr. Godfrey was also governor of the Halifax Ladies College, Pine Hill District Hall, and a member of the Board of Management of the Children's Hospital, Halifax.
He was director of the Eastern Trust Company, The Eastern Canadian Savings and Loan Company, Eastern Utilities Limited and the Halifax Insurance Company.
Mr. Godfrey took particular interest in many Halifax institutions and was on the Board of Directors of the Halifax Association for Improving the condition of the poor.
He was a member of the Halifax Board of Trade, president of the Halifax South Liberals Association, from 1940 to 1942. He was secretary of the Nova Scotia Branch of St. John Ambulance Association, 1940-46.
During his few leisure hours he was an ardent gardener and grew flowers at the rear of his home. His love for flowers and knowledge of the various species was well known among his many friends. He was very unselfish in this respect and spread flowers around the various Halifax institutions. They were from his own garden where he used to spend many tedious hours caring for his many plants. He would pick them carefully and consign them to Halifax institutions.
Mr. Godfrey married Helen Cameron, daughter of Ewen Cameron, Charlottetown, in 1924, and has two daughters, Joan married to Capt. Archibald McKenzie, and with the Canadian Army at Kingston, Ont., and Patricia, at home.
Also surviving are three brothers, Clifford Godfrey, manager of the Royal Bank of Canada at Parrsboro; Harry Godfrey, surgeon at Leicester, England, and Rupert Godfrey at Marshfield, P.E.I. His sister, Jean, Mrs. A. A. MacBeath, Marshfield.
Mr. Godfrey was a member of the Halifax Club, Halifax Golf and Country Club, Commercial Club, Royal Nova Scotia Yacht Squadron, the North British Society.
Besides the gardening pastime, Mr. Godfrey was also fond of fishing and golf.
