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NEWS FROM THE UNIVERSITIES

A Valuable Addition to Mount Allison.

The Closing Football Game at Dalhousie—Pine Hill opening—The Induction of Rev. Dr. Magill.

On the afternoon of Saturday Nov. 7th the closing game of the Senior Football League was played between the Wanderers and Dalhousie. The day was very disagreeable and the ground in a bad condition; consequently the playing was not at all of a swift nature. The Dalhousie team did the better playing throughout and in the end the score stood 6 to 0 in favor of Dalhousie. This victory gives the College boys the trophy. After the game was over the trophy was presented to the Captain of the Dalhousie team.

Dr. Ira McKay who at present is studying law in Dalhousie, addressed the students on Sunday afternoon on the subject "Knowledge and Religion." Dr. McKay handled his subject in a masterly way and for the greater part of an hour held his audience simply spell-bound. It would be impossible to give in short compass a detailed synopsis of the lecture. One or two ideas is all that we can give expression to. Knowledge he said was the information we gained through all the different feelings and sensations of our body. Science is about the one ninth part of knowledge. Religion is not science's name to certain dogmas. No, it is the simple and sincere following of One who was known as the man of Galilee, and he is the truly religious man who is willing to follow Him through joy and through sorrow, through sickness and through death.

At the close of the lecture, Miss Foster of Hartmouth, singing a pleasing solo, Dr. W. C. Murray ably performed the duties of chairman.

Pine Hill college opened on Oct 29th. There were nineteen regular students in attendance. In the third year there are four in the second, ten and in the first, five. Besides these there are several Dalhousie students taking the affiliated course.

On Wednesday evening Nov. 4th Dr. Magill, the new professor was inducted into the chair of apologetics which was vacated last year on the departure of Dr. Gordon to Queen's University. Dr. Pollock addressed the newly inducted professor. Dr. Magill made a suitable reply and in the course of his address proved himself to be an able and pleasing speaker.

Dr. Magill, comes to us with an excellent record in the past and we predict for him a brilliant career in the future.

On Sunday morning Rev. W. J. Watson our new Theological Professor preached in the Methodist church here. The sermon was the most enlightening and successful attempt made in the Sackville pulpit for some time. For half an hour the reverend gentleman held the audience spell-bound. He chose as his text John X. 10. He said in substance that Christianity was the only religion that brought life, complete and perfect life, into the world. Other religions were inspired of God. Buddha was inspired though not in the same way as Isaiah and Jeremiah. We had the words of life. Our duty was to pass them to other nations who had but partial light. In forcible burning words the preacher exhorted those present to be disciples of the Ever-Living Christ.

A valuable and interesting addition has been made to the Mt. Allison Museum. Dr. Andrews received last week some Egyptian antiquities. He received them from a friend now working on the staff of the Egyptian Exploration Society. Among the most noteworthy there is a set of dishes dating back to the second dynasty, an old spoon and some mummy wrappings. The collection which is made up of a great many articles is valued at some thousands of dollars.

Mr. Allison played the Chatham Football team last Saturday and defeated them 22-0. The game with Acadia is postponed till the 20th. The promenade concert comes off on the 13th.

HOMES NEEDED FOR INEBRIATES

Closing Session of W. C. T. U. Amicably and to the Satisfaction of all

Maritime Ladies Appointed Superintendents of Missions—Union's Views Presented in Resolutions

OTTAWA, Nov. 10.—The W. C. T. U. Convention has adjourned after getting through a formidable programme of business.

Mrs. A. Gordon on behalf of the Ottawa W. C. T. U. this afternoon presented the President with a handsome gavel for which the latter expressed her grateful thanks. Mrs. Gordon moved that the Dominion Union memorialize the Government in favor of the erection of homes for inebriates, but the motion was withdrawn on an expression of opinion that it would be better for the local union to try and erect a home.

Among the ladies from the Maritime Provinces who were elected superintendents of Missions was; Health and Heredity—Mrs. Brennan, Summerside, P. E. I. Resolutions on the following subjects were adopted:

1.—Upon the suggestion of Lady Henry Somerset, requesting Great Britain to take the necessary steps to restrain Turkey from oppressing its subjects, and if possible to present a recurrence of the atrocities.

2.—To discourage the giving of prizes in progressive games as a form of gambling.

3.—To prevent indulgence in the tobacco habit to the detriment of others on street cars, trains and steamboats.

4.—In favor of carrying out the mandate of the House of Commons and re-introducing the anti-cigarette bill into the House of Commons.

5.—Protecting against the following the prospects of a New Orleans gambling syndicate in the Winnipeg Tribune.

6.—Condemning the habit of using patent medicines in which there is a large percentage of alcohol.

7.—Urging the President of the World's Fair Exposition at St. Louis to use his influence for the suppression of houses of ill-fame and gambling places in that city.

8.—Reaffirming the Union's policy of total abstinence for the Union and prohibition for the State.

9.—In favor of a continuance of efforts for the better enforcement of the military regulations in regard to the sale of intoxicating liquors at cautions in military camps of instruction and better observance of the temperance pledge in military colleges.

10.—Encouragement of the training of women for public speaking and urging local unions to take part in local contests.

11.—In favor of scientific teaching as to the effects from the use of alcohol and tobacco being placed on the same footing as other studies in the public schools.

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CHICAGO STREET RAILWAY STRIKE

Three Thousand Men are Out—No Cars Running

And Citizens Must Walk—Mails Still Being Carried by Electrics—Belief that Hazing Killed Loew.

CHICAGO, Nov. 12.—(Special).—The City Railway Company employees went on strike today and all the people have to walk.

The strikers did not interfere with the movements of the mail car but prevented all passenger cars being run by non union men.

Over three thousand men are out and 230 miles of surface lines tied up.
