Opposition To British Proposal

(Special to the Guardian) GENEVA, May 3.—Britain joined France today in urging limitation of war material by curbing the budget appropriations of the powers for that purpose, but the United States refused to withdraw its opposition to the proposal. Lord Cushendun of Britain insisted that direct limitation of war material would be impossible without a system of international control which he held unacceptable.

AMOUNT INCLUDED FOR C. N. R. HOTEL

Initial Sum Of \$200,000 Placed In Railway Estimates For New Hotel In Charlottetown.

In a wire to The Patriot, Mr. R. H. Jenkins, M.P., states that an initial sum of \$200,000 has been included in the Railway Estimates tabled before the Select Standing Committee for a C. N. R. Hotel for Charlottetown. The report has not yet been adopted by the committee. The Railway estimates also include \$100,000 for widening the gauge of the Murray Harbour Railway and \$175,000 on account of terminals at Charlottetown.

Much Damage Caused By Heavy Rainfall In Ont.

(Special to the Guardian) TORONTO, Ont., May 3.—Damage that will run into hundreds of thousands of dollars and property losses that cannot yet be estimated have been caused during the past 24 hours by an almost unprecedented rainfall, which has already swollen mere creeks into mighty rivers and spread havoc generally in its wake.

Ship Inspected By Royalty

LONDON, May 3.—The Duke and Duchess of York and Prince George today inspected the historic research ship Discovery which is lying at the West India docks being repaired for the coming Australian-Antarctic expedition. They were shown over the ship by Rt. Hon. L. C. M. Amery, Secy. of State for the Colonies; Sir Granville Ryrie, Australian high commissioner and Sir Douglas Mawson, who will lead the expedition in its two years of voyaging in Antarctic seas.

Railways Give Reduced Rate

(Special to The Guardian) CLEVELAND, May 3.—The sun shone today for brokers and operators who have not been doing the grain business that is usually booked at this time when word came from Washington that railroad leaders have agreed to a reduction of two cents a bushel on rail shipments from Buffalo to the Atlantic seaboard.

Battalion On Foreign Service

(Special to the Guardian) LONDON, May 3.—An order most unusual in peace time, sending a battalion of guards on foreign service was issued among "additional moves of units during the year 1928-29 approved by the war office." The 1st battalion Welsh guards are to leave England for Egypt on a "short tour" of garrison duty.

PARIS, May 3.—Negotiations for the settlement of German reparations at the second reparations committee remained at a standstill tonight after a conversation between Owen D. Young, Chairman of the Committee, and Dr. Hjalmar Schacht, who had just returned from Berlin.

Federal Aid Will Be Sought

(Canadian Press) SAINT JOHN, N. B., May 3.—The aid of Dominion authorities will be sought by liquor officials in New Brunswick in an effort to combat illegal use of molasses alcohol it was said here today by R. G. Fulton, chairman of the liquor control board of that province.

Item Carries For P. O. Salaries

Increase Of \$339,530 Voted Over Last Year's Estimates.

(From our own Correspondent) OTTAWA, Ont., May 3.—Last evening the discussion on the postmaster-general's department took a new slant, and was concentrated on the salary of postal employees.

The Hon. Mr. Guthrie took the position that this could not be done unless in justice to the rest of the service other salaries were also increased. The Hon. Mr. Guthrie took the position that parliament was supreme and it was its duty to right wrongs where they existed regardless of class or distinction.

Conservative speakers were twitted by Hon. Charles Stewart, Minister of the Interior, with inconsistency—at one time commending the postmaster-general for infringing the civil service act, and now seeking to override both the act and commission.

Conservative speakers retorted there was a vast difference between a minister overriding the Civil Service Commission and parliament disregarding the advice of the commission in regard to salaries.

On the resumption of proceedings this afternoon, 25 out of 35 divorce bills from the Senate received first readings without opposition and then the fight in committee against the postmaster-general was continued.

The dropping of the royal monogram "G. R." from certain postal equipment was the subject of a question by Mr. Stewart. He was bringing the matter up on behalf of T.L.
