Hamilton Cup Now is Own; Second in All Canada

The following clipping from the Daily Herald, Prince Albert, Sask., Feb. 24th refers to Mr. T. S. McGrath, son of Mr. and Mrs. James McGrath, Morell, P. E. I. T. S. McGrath, manager of the Birch Hills Co-operative Creamery, is in the city today on his way home from Moose Jaw where he has been attending the annual convention of the Western Dairyman's association. Mr. McGrath is taking with him his usual amount of the jewelry offered in the competition. First, he takes home the Hamilton cup, donated by the Hon. C. M. Hamilton, minister of Agriculture, for the highest average score on butter graded in the province during the year. Mr. McGrath has won this competition four years in succession, and the Hamilton cup offered in connection with it two years in succession and this time he is taking the cup home for good. There were 65 creameries in the province entered in the competition. To be eligible to enter 90 percent of all the butter made at the creamery during the year must pass the government grader. Accompanying the cup is a gold medal which Mr. McGrath also retains. In an all Canadian competition in which 65 creameries were entered, Mr. McGrath's exhibit stood second. In the De Laval competition for this province, Mr. McGrath took first. In an inter-provincial competition for the western provinces his standing was third. Mr. McGrath has won this event in a number of years previously. Northern Saskatchewan again proved itself to be in the forefront of dairy progress by its winning at the butter competitions held in conjunction with the Western Canada Dairyman's annual convention held at Moose Jaw during the past few days. In the competition for Class A creameries which include those whose butter production exceeds 150,000 pounds, Prince Albert won second prize for the highest average score on butter during the year. In Class B of this competition of creameries producing less than 150,000 pounds, Birch Hills took first prize and Rosthern Creamery and Produce Company, Limited, took second prize. Birch Hills' winnings occur so regularly that they are expected and the Prince Albert Creamery also has been steadily forging its way forward. The success of the Rosthern Creamery, a subsidiary concern to the Prince Albert Creamery company, is very significant owing to the fact that it is one of the youngest creameries in the province, having been started only a little over a year ago. This is one of the most important competitions held, as it reflects the whole year's work," said R. W. Helm, manager of the Prince Albert Creamery, in speaking of the results achieved. Mr. Helm explained that one of the requirements was that at least 95 percent of the churnings during the year must be graded by the government butter grader. The creamery was required to send a sample from each churning to the grading station in Saskatoon and the butter grader there based his score on the flavor, salting, body and color of the butter, and appearance of the package. Additional value was immediately obtained by the

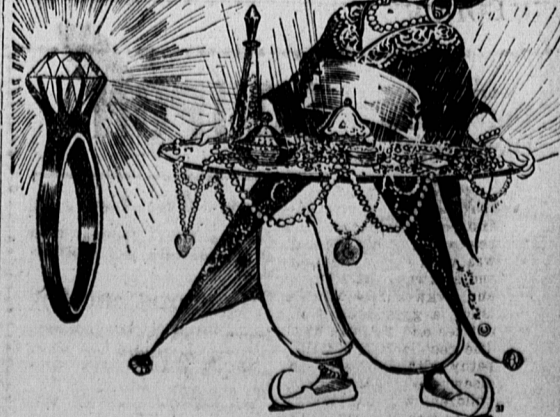
